FLOCKING TO CANADA.

President Shaughnessy of C. P. R. Tells Britishers of the Greatness of the Dominion.

AMERICANS TAKING ADVANTAGE OF OPPORTUNITY.

MONTREAL, April 8.—The Star's London cable says: Sir Thomas Shaughnessy struck an emphatic Canadian note in the presence of hosts of Americans at the Pilgrim's dinner last night in honor of Lord Curzon. Previous speeches having dwelt specially upon Anglo-American accord, Sir Thomas Shaughnessy brought a timely reminder that there was a good half of the American continent labeled Canada.

He called Elihu Root, speaking as with the tongue of the president of the United States, to witness that what was a little domain on the border of the States, has now grown to a great and powerful nation. He begged Englishmen to weigh well that vital fact and not to imagine they had seen the wonders of America when they stopped short of Philadelphia or Chicago on their way north. Americans themselves were not so slow to take

full advantage of the opportunities Canada offered as witness the large migration of hosts of American settlers who were becoming excellent British subjects in Canada. He also bore tribute to French-Canadians at attachment to the British institutions.

Here in England men's minds began in these latter days to wander into schemes for the nationalization of railways. Canada had learnt her lesson in that respect for she had in the Intercolonial line a magnificent example of how far wrong a government managed railway could go and it was a moment of failure of government administration in the distance that Canada had by means of the privately managed C. P. R. brought the great western plains to the very doors of the eastern populations and this line of progress was being followed by the Grand Trunk Pacific and Canadian Northern enterprises.

YOUNG WOMEN MIXED IT.

Co-eds of U. N. B. and Normal School Played Rough Basketball

One Girl Had Teeth Knocked Out; Another Nose Bleed.

Authorities May Take Steps To Stop Recurrence of Accidents.

In view of the recent accidents there is now some doubt expressed as to whether or not the authorities of the University will allow the young lady students to continue to play basketball.

It is only a few days since Miss Grace Fleming, of St. John, had her knee badly injured in a practice game at the University gymnasium, and on Saturday she had to be taken to her home in St. John where she will be laid up for some time.

On Saturday afternoon the young women of the Normal School and the University engaged in another game of basketball and the game was pretty rough, as is evidenced by one of the ladies having two of her teeth knocked out and the other being hit hard enough on the nose to cause it to bleed.

The game on Saturday was won by the Normal School ladies by a score of 5 to 1.

PANIC STRICKEN PEOPLE FLEE.

Floods of Lava Pour from Vesuvius on Surrounding Country.

2000 Acres of Cultivated Land Ruined.

Town Overflowed and Many Others in Danger from the Flood.

NAPLES, April 8.—Mount Vesuvius is a colossal brazier and the town of Boscatrecas on its southern declivity has been transformed into a great ruin. Torrents of liquid fire, resembling in the distance serpents, with glittering yellow and black scales, are coursing in all directions, amid rumblings, detonations and earth tremblings, while a pall of sulphurous smoke that hovers over all makes breathing difficult.

The streams of lava are resistless. They snap like pipe stems the trunks of chestnut trees and the roofs of old and blight with their torrid heat, the blooms on the peach trees before the trees themselves have been reached. The molten streams do not spare the homes of the peasants, and when these have been razed they dash into the wells, as though seeking to slake their thirst.

Everywhere in the vicinity of the volcano pitiful scenes are witnessed—women tearing their hair in their grief and old men crying aloud at the loss of their beloved homesteads, while in the distance in striking contrast, lie the sapphire colored Mediterranean, the violet mountains of the Sorrento peninsula and the top of the Caprey in the tranquil sea.
