

THREE LIVES LOST BY DROWNING.

Toronto Youth Drowned in Presence of Sweetheart.

CHINESE LOST OFF CANOE.

Another Lad Jumped Into the Lake While Overheated, Took Cramps and Was Drowned—Five Men in the Water for Two Hours—Rescued From Optirised Craft.

Toronto, July 2.—Two drowning fatalities occurred in Toronto yesterday afternoon. One at the Island and the other at Victoria Park. Shortly after 4 o'clock Edward Chapman, who lived with his widowed mother at 881 Yonge street, accompanied by his fiancée, Miss Eva White, 118 Bloor street west, and several relatives went out to the park to spend the holiday. Chapman decided to go bathing and had only been in the water a few moments when he was noticed by his friends to wave his hands frantically. At first no attention was paid to him, but Miss White observed that he rose and sank several times, and becoming alarmed, called out to those on the beach to swim from drowning. Several rushed into the water, but the young man had disappeared, and after about a quarter of an hour's search the body was recovered. Physicians were immediately called, and although they worked on the body for two hours they were unsuccessful in restoring life. Chinaman Drowned at Island. Woo Way, of 504 Queen street east, was drowned in Long Point, Centre Island, about 4 o'clock in the afternoon. Accompanied by another Celestial he went canoeing, and his ignorance of that form of boating resulted in his death. Two men secured the canoe, it is not known where—and a pair of ordinary oars instead of paddles. The men stood up in the canoe, but only got a short distance from shore when it capsized. Mr. Horrocks, of Fawcett avenue, Centre Island, happened along at the time, and seeing one of the Chinamen struggling in the water, succeeded in bringing him safely to shore. Mr. Horrocks and several others finally, after a long search, brought up the body of Woo Way. Dr. James M. P. H. and his son, besides several other witnesses to the accident, worked over the body for more than an hour, but life was extinct. Two Boats Were Capsized. Toronto, July 2.—In the heavy gale yesterday afternoon three venturesome young men started out in a dinghy from Oakville to Toronto. When opposite the island of Champlain farm, about three miles from Oakville, the boat was swamped. Lymon Gooderman, 15-year-old youth, and J. H. Bridge, a fruit grower, put out to the rescue in a small boat, but the sea proved too much for their craft, which was capsized. The five unfortunate men were in the water for over two hours, clinging to the upturned boats. One of the party was rescued by a fisherman, and another was rescued by the fishermen, who were rescued from their waists down, and all but gone when assistance reached them. Dr. Lequhart, who was a passenger on the Niagara, had the five unfortunate put to bed, where restoratives were applied. Lad Drowned in the Lake. Toronto, July 2.—"I'll be first in boys" With these words Harry Bevel, perspiring and out of breath, jumped into the lake at the foot of Dundas street. A few moments later his dead body was brought to shore. The lad, who was 16 years of age, with a number of companions, had gone down to bathe, about 2:30, and had only been in the water a few moments before he was seized with cramps. He was conveyed to the hospital, but he died before they could realize what was happening, the boy was beyond recovery. He was conveyed to a good swimmer by his companions.

BANKERS' LIABILITY.

They Must Not Mislead the Public by Certifying False Reports. Montreal, July 1.—The Banque du Peuple failure was recalled by a judgment rendered yesterday by Justice Robitoux, condemning Jacques Grotier, who was President of the bank at the time of the failure, to pay Mr. Toussaint Prefontaine, one of the directors, a sum of \$43,000, four per cent interest. The plaintiff took action for the amount, as the sum for which he had become liable as a director through the failure of the institution. He alleged that he had been induced to become a director through the representations of the President, who had certified the correct statements of the affairs of the bank. It was afterwards shown that these statements were incorrect and misleading.

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TO CIRCLE THE WORLD.

President Roosevelt Will Start a Message on a Marvellous Trip. New York, July 1.—Something akin to a miracle will be the flashing of a message around the world in four minutes on July 4th. President Roosevelt will fill out a telegraph blank at Oyster Bay Saturday, and almost before the ink on the pen is dry the message will be flashed westward over the Pacific, through remote countries and back to his desk again. This will be the first telegram to be sent around the world, the recent extension of the Pacific cable from San Francisco to Hawaii, Guam, Manila and China, making the line from Honolulu to Manila, a distance of 6,500 miles, will be used for the first time in the sending of the President's message. From Oyster Bay the message will speed on to San Francisco, Honolulu, Hawaii, Manila, Hong Kong, Madras, Moscow, St. Petersburg, Hamburg, London and back to New York. Thirty operators will take part in the transmission of the globe-encircling message.

BOGUS PRINCE SENTENCED.

Coachman's Son Who Married Lady Russell Gets Off Light. London, July 1.—William Brown, a coachman's son, who married Mabel, Countess Russell, at the Registry Office in Portsmouth last December, when he posed as a Bavarian nobleman, with the title of Prince Atrobaud Stuart de Modera, and who was arrested last April on the charge of making a false entry in the marriage register, has been sentenced to two days' imprisonment. It is believed he had been in custody since the time of his arrest, he was immediately released.

LORD COLVILLE DEAD.

Chamberlain to Queen and President of Artillery Company. London, July 1.—Lord Colville of Culross, Lord Chamberlain to Queen Alexandra and president of the Honourable Artillery Company, died in London this evening. He was nearly paralyzed at some weeks ago. He was born in 1818, and during his career filled several positions about the court. In 1852 he was chief equerry and chamberlain to the late Queen Victoria, master of the buck hounds 1866-68, and chamberlain to the Prince of Wales from 1873 to 1901. He was chairman of the Great Northern Railway from 1872 to 1895.

NO LETTER EVER CAME.

"I cannot understand why the money does not come," said Brandl over and over again to his friend. "Do not worry," said a friend. "I will send you what money you need until the remittance arrives." MAD MULLAH DEFEATED.

War Office Receives News of the Egyptian Victory. London, July 30.—The War Office today received a despatch from Col. Rochfort, one of the British officers serving with the Abyssinian force in Somaliland, which says the Abyssinians on May 31st, after a series of forced marches, struck the Mad Mullah's forces near Jeyl, surprising them at dawn and killing 1,000 specimens, and capturing almost all their cattle and sheep and 1,000 camels. Col. Rochfort adds that the Abyssinians have effectively closed to the Mullah all the watering places south of the Gerogubi-Gadali line, and he hopes they will soon be in contact with the British forces. The Mullah is able to co-operate in the pursuit of the Mullah who is retarded in his movements by the fact that he is crossing a waterless part of the country. The colonel's despatch was dated June 14th.

Shot Sister Dead.

Halifax, N. S., June 30.—D. Morse Balcom, a farmer of Lawrenceton, Annapolis, loaded his gun this afternoon, intending to shoot crows. As he was leaving the room his foot tripped and the gun was accidentally discharged. The shot entered the back of his sister Annie, killing her instantly.

UNIVERSITY FEDERATION.

Trinity Will Join With the University at Toronto. ONLY ONE MEDICAL FACULTY.

Although the federation of Trinity University with Toronto University is practically an assured fact, those conducting the negotiations have so far deemed it wise to do so in as quiet a manner as possible. Yesterday, however, a former member of Trinity corporation, talked freely about it, and this is about the way he stated the situation. The proposition submitted by Toronto University to Trinity corporation at the recent meeting, was in effect as follows: Trinity University is to become affiliated with Toronto University, all degrees conferred by the latter to be conferred in the name of Trinity University. Trinity College is to have the right to teach the doctrines and carry on the worship of the church of England. Lectures in arts at Trinity are to be counted as university lectures, and lectures on scientific subjects are to be duplicated at Trinity, provided there are enough students to justify the expenditure. Trinity University is to surrender her autonomy, and regulate her academic year, according to Toronto. Trinity medical faculty to be incorporated with Toronto medical faculty. The fees of Trinity University are to be reduced from \$65 to \$35 a year. This plan of federation was first submitted to the medical faculty, and while the dean and professor were both to assist at the obsequies of Trinity medical, they realized that federation was the only solution of the problem, and so accepted the proposition.

THE POPE SEEMS WELL.

Aged Pontiff Took a Drive of an Hour and a Half. Rome, June 30.—The best proof that there is nothing serious the matter with the Pope's health is that he descended to the Vatican gardens this morning for the first time this year, and was driven about for an hour and a half. The Pontiff seemed to enjoy the open air immensely, and noticed the change made in the gardens since last year. He was specially interested in the growth of the vines planted by himself and made inquiries regarding the prospects of the vines. When the Pope returned to his apartments he was not in the least fatigued and received several bishops, including the Right Rev. John Rooney, coadjutor and apostolic vicar of Cape Town, Cape Colony.

A Double Tragedy.

Leeds, Mo., June 29.—Mrs. Nora Winfrey, aged 19 years, has committed suicide by jumping from a bridge over the Blue River. Her husband, Geo. Winfrey, aged 21 years, was drowned while trying to rescue her. It is said Mrs. Winfrey was despondent because of a quarrel. SUSPENDED ELECTRIC RY

To Formally Opened by the Kaiser Shortly.
