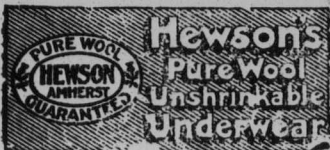


## THE LOCAL NEWS

### A NARROW ESCAPE

Three men on the Mullins branch of the Northwest Miramichi had a thrilling experience a few days ago that they are not likely to forget. Messrs. The men knew no more till they were picked up several yards away from the fire about an hour afterwards by some of their comrades. Their faces were badly burned and lacerated with flying earth. It was extremely fortunate that there was no heavy material on top of the dynamite so he hurled in the air. As it was one of the men's eyes were closed for several days and the hearing of one has been badly affected. That they escaped with their lives is almost a miracle.

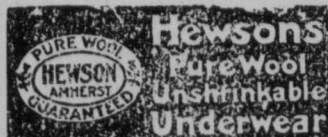
