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GREAT METEOR FELL INTO LAKE

Cities About Lake Michigan
Thought it Earthquake
Shock.

Detroit, Mich., Nov. 27.—That a meteor of tremendous size plunged into Lake Michigan last night causing earth tremors felt in a dozen southern Michigan cities and sending a pillar of flames hundreds of feet into the air and visible for a radius of more than fifty miles, was the theory generally accepted early today in explanation of an earth shock which at first was believed to have been caused by a terrific explosion at some industrial plant.

From reports from various Michigan, Indiana and Illinois cities where the blinding flare was visible, it appeared the centre of disturbance was near the lower end of Lake Michigan. Coast guards at Grand Haven were firm in their assertion that they had witnessed the descent of the heavenly body.

Residents of Battle Creek, Kalamazoo, South Bend, Grand Haven and other western Michigan cities fled from their homes in panic, fearing an earthquake. Houses were shaken and many were illuminated as by a bright sun's rays, so all-enveloping that it was impossible to tell from which direction the flare came. The earth trembled half a minute, then came a prolonged rumbling as of a terrific explosion.

PASTOR SAYS SOCIAL ORGIE MENACES U. S.

Women Dress Like Underworld,
Leave Nothing to
Imagination.

MANCHESTER, N. H., Nov. 23.—Rev. T. J. Horner, pastor of the Unitarian Church, declared from his pulpit today that "a period of social orgie threatens this country," and that "a godless country cannot have a government that will survive." He said: "To-day women in the best families are dressing as only the most brazen women of the underworld abroad would think of dressing. They leave nothing to the imagination. The big restaurants are filled at midnight, and in imagination I can see the devil, dressed in red with a leer in his eye and his tongue in his cheek, leading the procession of dancers winding in and out among the tables. What happens in New York will later happen in Manchester and every other city in America."

"Here in America 62 per cent. of the people never darken a church door from one end of the year to the other. The time was, here in New England, when it was a rare thing for a family to sit down to a meal without thanking God for it, but how many of them do it now, though they are descendants of the Pilgrims? There is no such thing as real delicious gratitude in this country, because there is no religion which represents the spiritual side of democracy."

"The saving grace of the situation is in the spirit of the Pilgrims which prompted them under God to appoint a day of special thanksgiving in which their gratitude reacted in their personal share for each other's good temporarily as well as morally, which did the foundations of American liberty so deep and strong that democracy has swept the nations and girded the world."

RIBBON AND HOLLY TO COVER BOMBS

Philadelphia, Pa., Nov. 22.—Discovery of a Red plot to slay officials with explosives in Christmas mail packages is announced by Superintendent of Police James Robinson.

Information of the plot which he considers reliable indicates it is a nation-wide, and directed against federal, state and city authorities who took part in the national round-up of radicals planning the overthrow of the government.

Steps were taken to prepare federal investigators, postal authorities and police of large cities for action against the "mail terror," which is scheduled to begin operation shortly before and during the Christmas holidays.

Evidence of the existence of a plot to send bombs through the mails under ribbons and holly, was reported to Superintendent Robinson by Andrew Emanuel, head of the bomb squad, who said he unearthed it during his investigation of radical activities here. The information was carefully withheld by the police. It is believed to originate from an anarchist "Squelcher" who was afraid of the consequence of the plot.

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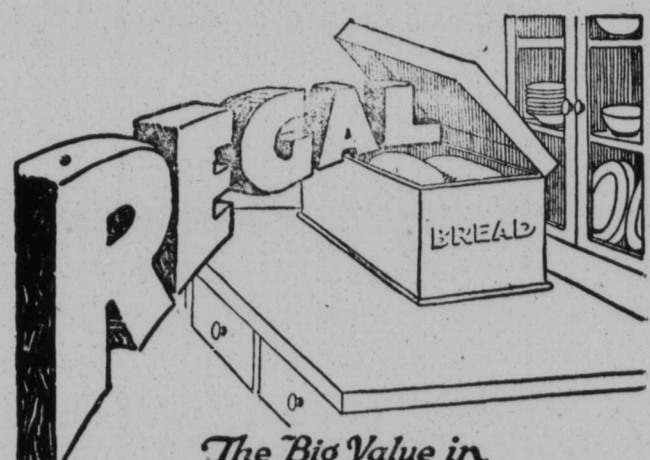
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
