LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

SIXTEEN sheep were killed by dogs at Kinkora one night last week.

ALMOST 100 men have deserted from the shipyard since she was placed on this station. 20 deserted in Quebec.

THREE immense scores are about to be built for the Hillside Bridge works. Two of them will be 75 by 24 feet with six feet depth and the other will be 100 by 28 feet and seven feet deep.

A BOAT race open to lobster boats from the whole Province will be held in Charlottetown harbor on September 15th. Entrance close with A. Pickard, Pease's No. 1 wharf on Sept. 13th.

In regard to the announcement that Sir William McDonald would provide in each province an object lesson in the form of an improved and consolidated rural school, Prof. Robertson says that the Prince Edward Island consolidated school will be placed in Pownal district.

FRED McRORY, painter, of this City, was working at the outside of the Presbyterian Church at Marshfield several days ago, when his ladder slipped, and he fell to the ground, a distance of 20 feet. He escaped with a sprained wrist.

We have received from the McAlpine Publishing Co., of Halifax, a handsomely illustrated booklet entitled "The Royal Coronation," which gives a full account of the events of the King's life up to the time of the Coronation. The work contains fifty pages and is printed on heavy cream paper.

Miss Angelina Molins, daughter of Mr. Augustus Molins, Barnack, left by the Princess of Wales morning train for Pictou, to pursue her studies in the Convent of St. Maria. Her brother, master Austin returns to St. Dunstan's College to continue his studies.

A sad accident took place at Montague Head a few days ago. While Mr. Murdoch McLean of that place, was handling a binder, his two year old boy got his hand into the knoter, and as the machine was tripped his hand was cut off half way between the wrist and the elbow joints. The little child suffered severely. The wound was dressed by Dr. J. D. McIntyre and P. MacLean.

The boat race at Souris was successfully carried off on Saturday, the boats being unable to finish within the time limit on the two previous days on account of lack of wind. The time limit of three hours was observed. The winners were by the Lina May, owned by H. C. McLean of Souris, with Defender, owned by Lucas Allan, Summerside, second; Shamrock, owned by John Condon, Ramore Island, third; Mamie C. owned by J. W. McPhee, Annapolis, fourth; and Leaning, owned by H. Holman, Summerside, fifth. The regatta was not as largely attended as on the previous days, many of the visitors owing to the postponement having returned to their homes.

AMONG the passengers from Montreal on the steamer Coban which arrived here on Friday were twelve Equimaux. They were returning to their homes in Labrador, after having spent three years in different American cities, where they had been on Exhibition. Their last place was Detroit. They complain bitterly of the treatment received at the hands of the agent who had provided them with bogus tickets. The Coban left for St. John, Nfld., and from there the Equimaux take passage by the Virginia Lake to the Labrador coast.

THE Dominion fruit inspector at Winnipeg has sent to the department a box of apples taken from the middle of a consignment of apples shipped to Winnipeg by a firm in Galt, Ont. The apples were described by the shipper as "fancy Canadian apples," but the specimens sent to the department are of very poor quality. Twenty of them weigh only 28 ounces. Twenty hens' eggs of good average size would weigh 40 ounces. Departmental officers say Ontario fruit being shipped to the excellent markets of Manitoba and the Northwest Territories in this dishonest manner is killing the trade and playing into the hands of fruit growers and shippers from California. The inspector has been instructed to prosecute the shipper in this instance, and in every similar instance which comes under his notice.

A SEAMAN named George Jacques, of the schooner F. B. Wade, had a narrow escape from death the other day. The incident occurred at Halifax. The sailor was up on the topmast head, ninety-one feet from the deck, sitting in the "boon's chair" clinging the mast, when the rope holding the chair slipped. Passengers on the steamer Olivette which was moving out of the harbor at the time, turned away their heads in horror as they saw the man fall. About halfway to the deck he struck a rope which broke the force of the fall and landed on his face on a folded jib. The only injury he received was a broken nose. He was about his duties as usual the next morning.

THE Montreal Star says: There has been some doubt as to whether the program of the Canadian Amateur Athletic Union Championship games this year, because in the past there have been so few entries. Today it looks, however, as if such a number would be surely added if for nothing else than to encourage young men from far away places. E. H. Brown, Secretary of the Canadian Amateur Athletic Union, has written that while visiting in Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island, the executive of the local Athletic Club expressed their desire to enter W. Halpenny, the Maritime champion pole-vaulter for the championship, and he seems to think it advisable to give that gentleman a chance to obtain championship honors if he is good enough.

On Sunday last the obituary of bells presented to St. John the Baptist Church, Miscouche, by the sons of the late John Cunningham, of that place, in memory of their deceased father, were solemnly blessed by his Lordship, Bishop McDonald. Solemn High Mass, *Coram Episcopo*, was celebrated by Rev. Dr. Doyle, assisted by Rev. J. J. McDonald and Rev. P. P. Arsenault as deacon and sub-deacon of Office, Rev. D. J. G. McDonald and Rev. Curran of St. Dunstan's College as deacons of honor, and Rev. J. A. McDonald, P. P. Miscouche, as Master of Ceremonies. The sermon of Circumstances was preached by Rev. Dr. Gasthler of Palmer Road. The choir, with Rev. Theodore Gallant as organist, rendered splendid music. The sermon was from the following text: Praise the Lord on high sounding symbols, praise Him with symbols of joy, was a singularly able one.

Labor Day.

Labor Day, on Monday, was celebrated in good style in Charlottetown. The men of the various unions, numbering about 400 men, paraded the streets in the morning, headed by the 4th Regiment Band. In their uniforms, consisting of white pants and cap, they presented a very tidy appearance. In the afternoon they paraded to the grounds of the Charlottetown Amateur Athletic Association, where a good programme of sports was carried out. A large number of spectators were present, the grand stand being filled and the fences along the sides lined. It was demonstrated in these sports that P. E. Island is still able to maintain her own in the matter of athletics. Donahoe, Duffy, McMillan, Jones, Halpenny and Brown were again to the front, as of yore. The Maritime record for the 100 yards dash was equalled by Robert Donahoe, his time being 10 seconds flat. Philip Duffy won the 220 yards in 23.4 seconds. Walter Jones, of Pownal, smashed the Maritime record in the heavy hammer contest, throwing it 114 feet, this being 4 feet 4 inches ahead of the old record. Halpenny the "boy wonder," in the pole vault, cleared the top of the uprights easily—10 feet, 4 inches—breaking the M. P. A. record. There was no way to tell how much higher he could go. Byron Brown in the bicycle events in which he took part was a winner every time. Peter McDonald of Charlottetown, in the 1 mile run, put up a plucky race. His time was 5.15.
