Sir Richard Cartwright Elected by Acclamation.

ABLE SPEECH BY THE MEMBER ELECT.—Speech in Review of the Year Past—The Signs of the Times as Foreseen in the By-Elections.

Seaford, Dec. 27.—Nomination was held in the Town Hall here to-day for the purpose of selecting candidates for the representation of South Huron in the Dominion House of Commons.

Mr. Richard Cartwright, upon being introduced to the audience, came forward amid a rousing round of applause. He said several years had elapsed since he last had the honor of addressing the electors in this place.

IMPORTANT AND SIGNIFICANT EVENTS had transpired in the Province, viz: the by-elections, which had resulted in sustaining the Government of Mr. Mowat.

He had been described as unjust, unfair, ungenerous, unprincipled, unkind, ungrateful, illtempered, illmannered, vindictive, reckless, implacable, indecent, foul-mouthed, howling, discourteous, cowardly, obstinate, self-willed, conceited, brazen-faced, egotistical, deceitful, planning, pedantic, ungenerous, artificial, ostentatious, churlish, silly, weak, changeable, vacillating, insolent, impertinent, brutal, braggart, despicable, revolting, idiotic, malevolent, ignorant, contemptible, cruel, cantankerous, presuming, crafty, Pharisaical, sippant, affected, vulgar, base.

He had also been compared to a Nero, Caligula, Micawber, Herod, Pontius Pilate, Judas, Legree, Hellal, Beelzebub, Jonah, General Starratt, Molech, Machiaveli, Junius, Wilks, Judge-estri, madodon, karyman, sailbin, ost-ri, misanthrope, Pre-Adamite Tury, fossil Tury, demagogue, champion bully, Benedict Arnold, hypocrite, felon, malefactor, Janus, an apocryphal, traitor, bungler, rutton stick, Simon, Caliban, Shylock, doctrinaire, aloth, irredeemable ruffian, scavenger, aristocrat, lunatic.

He had further been recommended that the next time he appeared before a public audience he should be Received with a few brickbats. That he should be tarred and feathered. That he should be tossed in a blanket.

At intervals, as Sir Richard paused to draw breath while reading the above, his audience burst into repeated roars of laughter. He said it put him in mind of a statement once made by Sir Chas. Bagot, who had come to the conclusion that one of the first requisites of a Canadian statesman was to have a hide as thick as that of a rhinoceros in order to stand the abuse to which he would be subjected.

UNMASKING THE ENEMIES OF CANADA or exposing public wrong-doing whenever it came before his notice. (Applause.) He took up the charge that the Reform party are now without a platform, and that the Reform leaders are unable to raise any real issues for the consideration of the people.

BETTER PARLIAMENTARY REPRESENTATION for the people; preventing the gross extravagance characteristic of the present Dominion Government; reforming the Senate so that it cannot oppose its will to the declared will of the people; further defending

PROVINCIAL RIGHTS; maintaining the principles of Confederation; preventing the public funds from being squandered for corrupt purposes by a reckless Government; securing for the residents of Manitoba and the Northwest some better position than they now occupy to a Cabinet sitting at Ottawa, and preserving for the people of Canada liberty of thought, speech and action.

IN conclusion he said he believed that the Reformers of this country would stand fast to the old, SOUND, AND WELL TRIED PRINCIPLES, and would show any Government at Ottawa that all moneys and corrupt influences would be hopelessly and helplessly expended in attempting to defeat the sovereign will of a free and liberty-loving people whose voices they had so lately heard in unmistakable tones in Lennox, in Simcoe and in West Middlesex. (Long continued and enthusiastic applause.)

A resolution of thanks to the Chairman and cheers for the Queen, Sir Richard said the Liberal leaders concluded the proceedings.
