Phonography.

In the present mental and social advancement of the age the mode of communicating thought by the ordinary script of long-hand is felt to be cumbersome in the last degree, and unworthy of these days of invention. Why not employ simple signs instead of the present intricate and complex letters of our alphabet, as a. b. c. &c. A relief from the slavish bonds of long-hand is found in the airy characters of the "winged art"—Phonography, which is acknowledged by competent judges to be the best system of shorthand extant. It is the invention of Isaac Pitman, of Bath, Eng., and dates as far back as 1837.

Since then it has been steadily growing in favor. If the gigantic strides made by this labor-saving art can be called "staircase," its invention has made short-possible to the masses, as before that time shorthand-writing was known only to a few, who used it professionally, and was exceedingly difficult to master.

Dickens describes in "David Copperfield" his tragic attempts in learning an old system of shorthand, which accomplished the object of this system of shorthand we owe the daily reports of our Legislature, and the utterances of public speakers generally, besides its employment in the courts for recording evidence verbatim. Shorthand has many other uses. The merchant finds it invaluable in the dispatch of his correspondence, dictating to his amanuensis replies to his letters. The student by its use obtains concise notes of books to which he has not often access, and accurate verbatim reports of his lecture course.

The lawyer and physician find it useful for their diaries, memoranda and general composition. Those who are able to use it in private correspondence regard it as a "heaven-born" art, and the number of these is thousands upon thousands in the English-speaking countries of the world.
