Second Half.

On resuming hostilities at 8.15 Crescents at once got aggressive. This didn't last, however, and Feildians forcing the pace and combining well got dangerously near the Crescent net. At length the one and only Tait got an opening and tallied for his club amidst deafening cries of Feildians, when three minutes of this half had gone. Score—Crescents, 2; Feildians, 1. Encouraged by their success, and urged on by shouts of excited supporters, the College representatives played up in a determined manner, and Burnham in Crescent goal had to display some activity. The custodian, however, gave a brilliant display, making some miraculous saves—one in particular, which by jumping he caught the puck square on his chest, from which it bobbed off serenely, and Gus Herder lifted it to safety. As the game progressed the excitement grew amongst spectators. Both teams were bent on adding to the score sheet, and every player on the ice was trying all he knew of the game and straining every nerve for the mastery over his opponent. Crescents were giving the best all round display, the front line being particularly noticeable. Trappell especially, we think, being brilliant and exhibiting the best form ever displayed in his hockey career. Hubert Herder in the centre proved a very effective pivot, whilst the veteran cover point, Marshall, was in great form, and Gus Herder, although still suffering from the Paddon incident of the Crescent-Victoria match, well sustained his reputation as the most capable point in the championship class. On the Feildian side individual efforts were not lacking, but noted scorers were well looked after by the other side, and attempts at passing or combining were sadly marred by erratic off-side play in the front line, notably in the centre. Play was kept up at a fast pace right to the close of the match, the Crescents having the best of exchanges, and but for somewhat erratic shooting, weak finishing efforts and the great defence put up by Jeffrey, Strang & Co., a heavier tally would have been put up for the blue and white champions. As time was drawing near Feildians, who had been on the defensive, rallied, and getting aggressive, in a hustle in front of Crescent goal, Pearce got laid off for a short time. On a resumption of play hustling exchanges again occurred in the same vicinity, and Gus Herder in a collision with Simms got momentarily disabled, which occasioned another slight delay. Feildians again rushed, but off-side work checked their raiding efforts. Then Pearce was sent to the box for infringing. With the latter player off Feildians made a combined effort to equalize, and eventually just as Simms was in the act of shooting the bell rang, and almost simultaneously the white flag was dipped, denoting that a second Feildian tally was registered. ## Coopers Meet.

A meeting of the city coopers took place at the Board of Trade Rooms last night to discuss with a committee of the Board of Trade the question of reducing the prices of drums. Mr. G. C. Fearn, who occupied the chair, said that owing to the high prices charged by local coopers were not able to compete with foreign markets. Mr. W. C. Job endorsed this opinion, and said that he was most anxious to bring about an arrangement that would be mutually satisfactory to all parties, and that at the same time would obviate the difficulty referred to by Mr. Fearn. Mr. Geo. F. Power, a Master Cooper, said that at the present time the coopers were barely making a living out of the trade, and if prices were reduced they would have to close down and look for other employment. Mr. W. F. Horwood said that the increase in stock at the mills was responsible for the increase in the finished article. Mr. J. J. Mullally, Master Cooper, dissented from this view of Mr. Horwood. He believed that the introduction of machinery in recent years had caused an abnormal demand for coopers' stock, and consequently the prices were forced up. Owing to the high price of heading, staves and hoops now the coopers could not make any money out of the business like in the past before the introduction of barrel making machinery. Mr. W. B. Grievy believed that like in all other cases in commercial life supply and demand had all to do with the business, and that desultory discussion could not result in any amelioration of the conditions. He suggested the appointment of a committee to enquire into the whole subject, with instructions to go into the subject in all its details, and report to the general body. He would be glad to help out the coopers in every possible way. Mr. W. A. Munn said that it was a good thing to see such a meeting being held to discuss in a calm and friendly manner their difficulties.

The following resolution was put by the chairman, it having been proposed by Mr. W. C. Job and seconded by Mr. Thomas Smyth:—

Resolved, That the following gentlemen be a committee to consider the regulation of coopers' prices and other matters connected therewith, and to report at a meeting to be held within four weeks from this date:—W. B. Grievy, G. F. Power, James Cooney, W. F. Horwood, J. J. Mullally and M. Comerford.

## City Council Meeting.

A letter was received from the Colonial Secretary acknowledging receipt of documents to be presented in the House of Assembly.

Butler & McDonald, architects, who had sent in a plan of the new Seaman's Home to be erected by Dr. Grenfell on Water Street, asked the Council to sign the same, return it to them, so that they may be able to go ahead with the construction. They will be informed that the Council does not approve of the kind of roof shown by the plan, and are thereupon obliged to withhold signing the plan till this is altered. A permit will be given them to go on with the other details of the construction, but as far as the roof is concerned the applicants will have to alter the plan.

T. A. Pippy is given permission to make an extension to his workshop, Walsgrave Street, provided the building be finished with inflammable material.

M. Linegar again complained of the proximity of an outhouse near his dwelling on Theatre Hill which (the outhouse) is being used as a stable, and is the cause of great annoyance to himself and family. The Secretary was instructed to write the owner of the stable that he must no longer use it for that purpose, otherwise he will be prosecuted under the Act.

Harvey & Co. sent in a complaint in reference to the delay caused lately in watering the S. S. Rosalind. An immediate enquiry was ordered with a view to preventing a recurrence of the trouble in future.

The Engineer's report of progress of work at Windsor Lake was read; also reports of the city work of the Health Officer and Supt. Sanitary Department.

After passing the pay rolls, bills and requisitions the meeting adjourned.
