

**Coopers Meet.** A meeting of the city coopers took place at the Board of Trade Rooms last night to discuss with a committee of the Board of Trade the ques-

tion of reducing the prices of drums Mr. G. C. Fearn, who occupied the chair said that owing to the high prices charged by local coopers we were not able to compete with foreign markets. Mr. W. C. Job endorsed this opinion, and said that he was most anxious to bring about an arrangement that would be mutually satisfactory to all parties, and that at the same time would obviate the difficulty referred to by Mr. Fearn. Mr. Geo. F. Power, a Master Cooper, said stock at the mills was responsible for the increase in the finished article. Mr. J. J. Mullally, Master Cooper, dissented from this view of Mr. Horwood. He believed that the introduction of machinery in recent years had caused an abnormal demand for coopers' stock, and consequently the prices were forced up. Owing to the high price of heading, staves and hoops now the coopers could not make any money out of the business like in the past before the introduction of barrel making machinery. Mr. W. B. Grieve believed that like in all other cases in commercial life supply and demand had all to do with the business, and that desultory discussion could not result in any amelioration of the conditions. He suggested the appointment of a committee to enquire into the whole subject, with instruc-

tions to go into the subject in all its details, and report to the general body. He would be glad to help out the coopers in every possible way. Mr. W. A. Munn said that it was a good thing to see such a meeting being held to discuss in a calm and friendly manner their difficulties.

The following resolution was put by the chairman, it having been proposed by Mr. W. C. Job and seconded by Mr. Thomas Smyth:-

Resolved,-That the following gentlemen be a committee to consider the regulation of cooperage prices and other matters connected therewith, and to report at a meeting to be held within four weeks from this date:-W. B. Grieve, G. F. Power, James Cooney, W. F. Horwood, J. J. Mullally and M. Comerford.
