Belvidere Orphans'
Collection.

"He Who Gives to the Poor Lends to
the Lord."

How often, dear reader, have we
read or heard these words and what
effect have they had on our generos-
ity? No doubt we have heard them re-
peated many times, but with our cus-
tomary indifference we have given
them merely a passing notice, we have
pondered for a while but soon forgot.

However, as we approach the first
Sunday of September, we are annually
reminded of the Collection to be taken
up in the Catholic Cathedral and
Churches for Christ's Poor, who are
being attended to, and looked after by
the good Sisters of Mercy at Belvidere
Orphanage. In this Institute one

make ample provision for their up-
keep and to do all possible to alleviate
their sufferings and to compensate for
her care and attention for the loss
which the poor ones have sustained.
Following then the example of our
Blessed Mother, Holy Church, let us
give freely and generously of this
world's goods which we may possess
to the Orphans' Collection, and we
may rest assured that when the hour
of reckoning comes that He, who has
said "Since you have done it to one of
these the least of My brethren, you
have done it unto Me," will not forget
our little sacrifice made for the Or-
phans, and will reward us a hundred
fold in the Kingdom of Heaven.—Com.

Incandescent
Gas Lighting.

Possibly, the feature of incandescent
gas lighting most frequently noted by
casual observers is the great ease
with which tasks, ordinarily arduous
and difficult, can be performed
under the Welsbach gas mantle.
The light has a peculiarly "soft" qual-
ity, difficult to describe, but which is
readily recognized by those who have
had experience with the gas mantle
lamp.

In its general effect upon bodily
health and comfort, the use of incan-
descent gas lighting is decidedly fav-
orable. The currents of air set up by
the burning gas improves ventilation,
tending to expel the air vitiated by
respiration and draw in fresh air to
replace it. Harmful or dangerous dis-
ease germs are instantly destroyed in
the flame. The extent to which this
effect takes place may be verified by
placing a gas lamp close to a ceiling
without any provision for interfering
with the up-rushing air currents. The
charred particles which collect imme-
diately above the lamp are the re-
mains of dust particles which before
passing through the flames were lad-
ened with germs and microbes. Actual
experiments have shown that the
burning of gas lamps in rooms previ-
ously containing bacteria, resulted in
absolute sterilization of the air.

Contrary to the popular notion the
temperature of rooms lighted by in-
candescent gas lamps is seldom mark-
edly greater than under incandescent
electric light, even under unfavorable
conditions of ventilation, while in
rooms provided with the ventilating
facilities required by the demands of
hygiene, the temperature in gas-lighted
rooms is frequently lower.

Local Stokers
Trouble-Givers.

The incessant trouble given by local
stokers to ship-owners, who suffer
considerable expense and inconveni-
ence thereby, gives rise to the likeli-
hood of foreigners being brought here
to replace the Newfoundlanders to do
duty in the stockholds of steamers.
Although stokers in Canada, excepting
those in important services, are
paid less than the men engaged on
local shipping, yet to man the latter
is sometimes next door to impossible
and when the local stokers do sign on
they invariably hang up steamers.
