Market Notes.

Codfish.—During the past week
some 14,000 quintals of dry were ex-
ported from St. John's to foreign
ports. It is estimated that about 50,
000 quintals are yet in stores here.
This quantity should go out next
month, and then with clear stores and
the markets abroad making a good de-
mand prospects of fair prices for the
new catch look promising.

COD OIL.—Approximately 31,000
gallons of both Common and Refined
were shipped during the week ended.
Stocks on hand of 1917 process are
small. The demand has fallen off
considerably and local buyers are not
keen on purchasing any of last sea-
son's manufacture. Ruling prices to-
day are \$275 per ton for common and
\$250 per gallon for refined.

Herrings.—Scotch pack holders in
Green Bay are disposing of their lots
at prices ranging from \$13 to \$15.
This is regarded as selling at a loss
but they are up against a variety of
circumstances. Most of the ship-
ments are being taken direct to for-
eign markets. Split herring are being
held for a higher figure than the new
offering, viz. \$6.00. The quantity now
on hand should not be more than 10-
barrels.

LOBSTERS.—On the West and S.W.
Coasts reports coming in state that
the catch is below average. Weather
has been unfavourable but packers
hope to even up in July. North of St.
John's nothing has been done worth
speaking of. There is, as yet, no
price fixed upon for the next pack,
but one buyer has stated his willing-
ness to start at \$18.

Provisions.—Nothing new in the
Flour situation. A scarcity in Cana-
da and the United States, until new
wheat is marketed, now seems im-
minent. The growing crops look A1,
but it is of vital importance that a
due economy in the consumption of
present stocks be observed. Local
prices are \$14.50 to \$14.75 for superior
grades, and \$13.50 for war standard.
Pork prices appear to be steadily de-
clining and Ham Butt is quoted at
\$47 to \$47.50 wholesale, St. John's.
Fat Back and Clear, which are not
quick sellers at present are standing
at \$53 to \$54. Good Spare Ribs may
be bought for \$36.50. Beef continues
firm in both Chicago and New York
and there are signs of a further ad-
vance, the cause being the heavy de-
mand for War Rations. Bos. Flank \$41
to \$41.50; Bos. Packet, \$40; Boneless,
\$40; Cuttings, \$29.50, with local pur-
chasing very low. Full supplies of
American granulated sugar are not
obtainable, chiefly owing to shortage
of tonnage. There is plenty of No. 1
West India in stock, which is selling
at about \$9.25 per hundred pounds.
Molasses sales are quiet, all the sup-
plies for the fishery having been is-
sued. Prices are unchanged from last
week. There is not likely to be any
considerable shortage.

SCHOONER SAILS HERSELF.
"There's a sweet little cherub who
To keep watch over the life of poor
Jack."

The little cherub that looks after
Capt. Isaac Young has no "clinch."
The following reads like a book, but
is absolutely true so we are assured.
Capt. Isaac Young was going up the
bay in his schooner on Thursday.
There was himself his son, Garfield,
a boy of about 15 years, and two men.
After getting clear of the Arm Mr.
Young sent the two men below to trim
the salt white he and his boy navigated
the schooner. Somehow the punt they
had in tow got jammed, under the
quarter and Mr. Young sent the boy
to clear her. In doing this he fell
fall over run to his assistance and
he, too, fell over. Here was a situa-
tion, two of the crew in the water
struggling for life, while all uncon-
scious of what was happening above
the two men below worked away on
the salt, while the schooner with no
one in charge slowly drifted towards
Long Point.

Luck, or something else, had its eye
on Skipper Isaac and his boy, and
some men who were outside Burnt Is-
land in a boat saw the affair and plock-
ed them up. Then they chased the
schooner and overhauled her before
she drifted ashore, the men below
being very much surprised to learn of
what had happened.

breadth escapes, but we should im-
agine this was about as close a shave
as any.—Twillingate Sun.
