CLEAR VICTORY FOR RESOLUTE.

Defender Resolute tossed her six ninute and forty second handicap overboard to-day, and defeated Challenger Shamrock Four, boat for boat, in the fourth race of the regatta for America's Cup. To-day's race was the test of the series so far, Resolute completing the thirty mile triangular course in three hours, thirty-seven minutes and fifty-two seconds. Shamrock followed three minutes and fortyone seconds later, but the actual difference in sailing time was only three minutes and eighteen seconds. Resolute having led across the starting line twenty-three seconds.

A SEETHE OF DISORDER.

DROMORE, County Down, Ireland, July 23.—Rioting and pillaging by Unionists occurred here yesterday, and during the disorder crowds attacked the house of prominent Sing Feiners, the occupants of which fired upon the attackers as they approachcaptured.
