## Civic Commission.

### WEEKLY MEETING.

The weekly meeting of the City Council was held yesterday afternoon Mayor Goelling and Councillors Mullaly, Morris, Peet, Vincombe and Jackman were present.

The following business was transacted: Hon. Minister of Justice Warren submitted claim of Reserve Fireman Nixon for injuries received at the Star Hall fire, towards which the Government had voted \$47.50 on the understanding the Council would contribute a like amount. Cheque was ordered to be sent the Inspector General for the amount in question.

Communication was read from the Avalon Telephone Co. Ltd., claiming it was not liable under its charter for the tax for \$4.00 per phone as demanded. The matter was referred to the Solicitor for inquiry.

Letters were read from F. W. Ayre, T. A. Hall and Dr. R. A. Brehm in reference to dump near Rennie's Bridge. The use of this dump by the Council was discontinued a fortnight ago.

Gibbs and Barron, Agents Springfield Fire Insurance Co. Solicited share of insurance the Council may have to offer. Application was ordered filed.

Request of J. R. Johnston for water service to buildings near Burton's Pond will be acceded to provided he pays all expenses, etc. Plans submitted by J. J. Norris for proposed building Leslie Street, were deferred. The Eastern Trust Company advised they were communicating with Mrs. C. R. Thompson regarding this land in connection with the opening up of Sudbury property for a through street to Leslie Street. Application of M. Peckham, Gower Street, to install electric motor will be granted provided it has the approval of the Engineer.

F. S. Mundy asked information re-building regulations inside junction Freshwater and Merrymeeting Roads. The Council had no jurisdiction in the matter as the locality is outside the city limits.

Architect McCarthy on behalf of the Star of the Sea Society submitted plans for the erection of a new hall on Henry Street. Consideration was deferred.

After the reading of the reports of City Engineer, Health Officer, etc., and the disposal of minor matters the meeting adjourned.
