### Flour For Many Millions Comes From Minneapolis.

Minneapolis, March 10. (A.P.)--linneapolis maintained its title of "Mill City" in 1923, during which year flour to feed approximately 1,000,000 people, or almost onehird of the population of the United States, was shipped from the mills of the city.

Figures announced by the secretary's office of the Chamber of Commerce show that 54,966 cars, or 15, 458 740 harrels of flour were shipped from here during the year 1923. Usng the millers' unofficial estimate of alf a barrel per capita consumption year, based on previous years tabulations, the flour shipments total would indicate that about 31,000,-000 men, women and children were fed with bread and breadstuffs from

the local production. Totals for 1923 were considerably ower than the 1922 figures, the mills here running much below capacity most of the year. In 1922 60,449 cars containing 17,444,892 barrels

were shipped The 26 local flour mills have a normal capacity of practically 100,-000 barrels flour production a day, but insufficiency of suitable wheat raised in the northwest in recent years has curtailed the operations of the mills.

# Stuffed Sheep's Heart

By AN OLD MAID. "I like stuffed sheep's heart with a G' because it is good. I like stuffed sheep's heart with an 'H' because it is hot, and I like stuffed sheep's heart with an 'I' because it is inex-

This is the stuffing for this unpretentious, yet excellent, savoury: Shred a quarter-pound of suet, grate the rind of a lemon, mix and add a dessertspoonful of chopped parsley, a teaspoonful of lemon-thyme, and salt and pepper to taste; take of breadcrumbs eight ounces and stir all together well. Bind with two strained, beaten eggs.

Press this forcement tight into each heart-it makes sufficient for fourtie it down with twine, spread a lump of hutter or dripping on each, and set in a fairly hot oven to bake for thirty minutes. Baste liberally, and presenty add a little mushroom ketchup to the gravy
