new Craft Will

Supersede Battleship

LONDON, Dec. 7.—A revolution in the construction of fighting ships is being planned by Sir George Thurston, the naval architect who declares that the new type of craft, which he believes should be built, would supersede existing battleships and aircraft carriers by combining in itself the qualities of each. The new ship would carry thirty aeroplanes, six six-inch guns and twelve inch armaments. The displacement would be twenty-eight thousand tons and the speed twenty-six and a half knots per hour. These composite ships would be almost as much artillery in the water as the latest battleships of the Navy. The type has on sea and the aircraft carrier Eagle combined.

The ships would be practically invulnerable over with landing taking on aeroplanes. They would be so furnished the smoke being carried over the sides by water swept funnels. The present type of carriers are very vulnerable to attack. Commander Kenworthy has recently denounced the new airships saying that it would be a mistake for the nation to put all its eggs in one basket and the cost of a single ship would be five hundred times the cost of the present air carriers.

claims Equator

Shifting Position

NEW YORK, Dec. 8.—The Equator, according to the North American continent, is shifting.

It is the substance of geological information brought back by Dr. J. H. Thompson, a geologist employed by the Andes Copper Company, who has spent the last 10 years in the Andes mountains in South America, making observations.

After a study of volcanic conditions, Thompson is convinced, although not in a position to prove, that the equator is shifting.

In an effort to prove his theory, Dr. Thompson will spend six months at the observatory, where he will build concrete spheres, having a minimum diameter of three miles for observation purposes.

According to Dr. Thompson, he can prove that the Equator is really shifting. It will explain why the gorge of Hudson River, 100 miles from New York, is 1,000 feet below sea level.

It will also explain why the Mississippi River delta has been in the Gulf of Mexico 14 times during the known history of the earth. Changes in climatic conditions will be explained as well. Dr. Thompson's theory is proved correct.

The Silent Service

The life of the Royal Navy and the life of the landmen are not merely different each from the other, but each is incomprehensible to the other. The Navy built up for itself a tradition with which there is nothing comparable on land; a tradition of unbending discipline, of courtesy, of devotion to duty, of high courage, and of indomitable endurance. During the Seventeenth and Eighteenth Centuries the Navy was at war for years on end, fighting out of sight of England, which

learned to depend upon the Navy for an absolute security wholly unknown upon the Continent. It was the Navy which made possible and kept the peace of the Nineteenth Century, in which England waxed exceeding rich. The two Sea Services (Royal Navy and Merchant Service) remained poor, like a religious brotherhood vowed to poverty. And all down the centuries they accomplished a task which is none the less a wonder of the world because the English, excepting a poet here and there, take it for granted.—London Morning Post.

Says the Spirit Photographs Were Fraudulent

NEW YORK, Dec. 4.—Fraudulent spirit photographs, which in his opinion, have fooled Sir Arthur Conan Doyle and others are dealt with by Dr. Walter Franklin Prince, research officer of the Boston Society for Physical Research. In an article printed in the Scientific American. His article purports to show they were hoaxes.

After describing the famous spirit photograph of St. John the Evangelist and Cupid, which Sir Arthur declared to be the most remarkable spirit photograph he had ever seen, Dr. Prince continued: "Do London spiritualists never visit their National Gallery? There hung, and I suppose hangs now, the original of that picture of St. John and the four recognized children, unutilized and unexplained. Am I the first to discover the fact that the upper two thirds of a picture of Murillo's holy family is what furnished the basis of this 'spirit photograph'? The St. John

was meant by the artist for the Delly, the four recognized children are the cherubs common in such pictures two and a half centuries ago, the dove has been blotted out, by 'ectoplasm' and the lower half of the picture out away. But I will not dispute that this is the best spirit photograph ever." Nothing short of a successful series of tests by a committee, which includes an investigator experienced in psychical phenomena, by a photographer familiar with camera trickery and an expert conjurer, ever will or should convince an intelligent public, Dr. Prince says.

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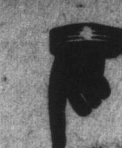
