### The High School Concert.

The fifth annual concert by the Liter-  
ary Society of the Glencoe High School,  
held in the Thompson Hall on Tuesday  
evening, was, like its predecessors, a  
brilliant success. Despite the stormy  
night the hall and gallery were well filled,  
and the programme, which was intro-  
duced by Mr. Bald, B. A., was a credit  
to the society. The selections by the  
glee club and orchestra were loudly  
encored. A recitation by Miss Helen  
Young was admirable given. Miss  
Darville recited very nicely, and the in-  
strumental selections by Misses Lumley  
and Harrison were deserving of much  
praise. The shadow, pantomimes, the  
solo "Old Black Joe" and the drama  
"Lady Clare," in which Sir Ronald lost  
a kiss, were loudly applauded. The  
broom drill and club swinging exercises,  
including the marches, by two classes of  
High School girls in pretty costume,  
were decidedly good. A military song,  
"Tenting To-night," by a number of  
"redcoats" lying around a camp fire  
after the battle, was very affecting. The  
pantomime "Cheerful Workers," and  
"Professor Van Courvoisier's Advertise-  
ment for Singers," a comedy, were very  
amusing. One element of the programme  
which was highly interesting, was a  
vaudeville address by Mr. C. G. Cornell,  
of Victoria University. Mr. Cornell  
dwelt upon the high standing of the  
school, the noble aims of his former  
schoolmates, and particularly upon the  
high and noble characters of the late  
Maurice Knight and Neil Harris.

During the intermission the principal,  
Mr. Bald, presented diplomas to those  
who succeeded in passing their Junior  
Leaving and Senior Leaving examina-  
tions of 1893, dwelling at the same time  
upon the high standing and progress of  
the school. The meeting closed with  
singing "God Save the Queen," after  
which those who took part joined in  
"Auld Lang Syne," and the audience de-  
parted, quite confident of the truth of  
the young Frenchman's saying—  
"Their Literary Society is a credit to the town,  
And their concerts are always the best around."

The overcrowding of the legal pro-  
fession threatens an evil to the country  
which is already being felt in certain  
quarters. At present newspaper pub-  
lishers appear to be the favorite victims,  
but it is only a matter of time when  
others of the community will feel its  
effect. There is a mania just now for  
instituting libel suits. The Toronto  
Globe has been threatened with several  
within the past two or three weeks. The  
London Advertiser is defending one in  
which the alleged libel was contained in  
a despatch from the United States over  
a year ago. Some twelve or fifteen pro-  
vincial papers are being called to account  
for republishing a story originating in  
the New York World. And so it goes,  
with actions against other papers on the  
most trivial grounds. An action threat-  
ened against the Woodstock Sentinel-  
Review the other day came practically  
in the form of blackmail. No honest  
journalist wishes to evade full responsi-  
bility for what he publishes. If he in-  
advertently wrongs a man, he is always  
willing to make reparation to the fullest  
extent; when a journalist maliciously  
libels anyone he does not deserve protec-  
tion. But newspapers ought to be pro-  
tected from malicious prosecution, and  
if the legal profession would maintain its  
respectability that class of vultures who  
are always fluttering around looking for  
carrion must be promptly drummed out  
of its ranks.

### Hints for Church Fairs.

Take nine reasonable sized oysters—  
not too large—to each five gallons of  
water, and tie them up carefully in a  
cloth.

If the fair is to continue only three  
days, cheese cloth will do; but if it holds  
a week and a large attendance is ex-  
pected, it is better to use a good, heavy  
quality of duck, so that the bivalves shall  
not lose their entire flavor the first few  
evenings.
