If the Indians are building their probable speculations of winning the pennant for 1907 on Mr. Fisher's ability to mesmerize the batters and cause them to wither before they go to the first hunk, they have let out the job of angling for the coveted rag to an inferior. Fisher's London had better fish around for some more pitchers—London, it will be observed, is still after us, but is yet quite a few laps in the rear. The ex-Guelphites on the London team were not responsible for the defeat yesterday.

Guelp Mercury: To see Fisher do the deed a dozen or more of London's enthusiasts accompanied the team. They followed Fisher all around town early in the day in obedience to the weak, human aspiration to associate with notable people, and when some awesome Guelpish would draw near they would point to the phenom, and with a knowing wink, remark in low but audible tones, "That's him; that's Fisher!"—Will somebody kindly lend London another pitcher or two?—Galt and London are systematically losing. THE TRIGGER.

AT BISLEY.

Bisley, July 17.—Rain and a strong wind affected the scores yesterday, as wind shooting is an impossibility in such rough weather. Most of the matches were shot through drenching rain. Several members of the Canadian team fired in the Pilex match—all comers. The distance is 60 yards with seven shots. In the Pilex match, Lieut. Mitchell, of the 12th Batt., scored 13, and Sergt. Crowe, of the 1st B. F., 30, with the aid of the bulls' eyes, one inner and two outer. Major MacDonald made 29, composed of two bull's-eyes, four inner and one outer.

In the Wilmot match, another open unqualified competition at 500 yards, Lieut. Weller, of the 5th Batt., put together 33 in a possible 35. His first five shots registered bulls, and his last two were inner, but close to the center disk. Pte. Hayhurst, last year's Queen's prize winner, was a competitor in the same match, and his score sheet, after he had finished, showed 22. His first shot was a bull, but in the second he shot wide to the upper right. He recovered himself quickly, and planted the four next shots in the center of the target, placing his fourth, fifth and sixth shots in a bunch. His last shot was on the left side of the target below his bunch.

Lieut. Ross, of the 18th Batt., made 31 in the Wilmot match. Weller did some excellent firing.

Major Bruce has selected Pte. Hayhurst, Sergt. Ozg, Lieut. Ross, Capt. Spearing and Lieut. Mitchell to shoot for the Kolapore cup, but both Col. Stark and Major Bruce find difficulty in selecting the other three members of the team.

Late in the afternoon the rain ceased, and the wind dropped away, leaving the sky overcast with clouds. The Canadians, who were far down on the entry list in the Wilmot match, then shot well, both Huggins and Spearing making 34, only one point under the possible. Spearing's first shot was an inner, and one after another afterwards he picked the bulls' eye.

BORN AND DIED TOGETHER.

Twins Drowned in the Don—One Sacrifices His Life for the Other. Toronto, July 17.—Two boys were drowned in the River Don, at Winchester street bridge, yesterday afternoon while bathing. They were Herbert and Arthur, 15-year-old twin sons of a letter carrier. One was drowned while endeavoring to save the life of his brother.
