The Alerts Win a Close and Well-Played Game.

Lasker Wins the First Prize in the Chess Tourney at Nuremberg.

SALTED THE HAMS.

The game between the Alerts and Hamiltons Saturday was one of the most hotly-contested games of the season, even apart from the temperance, both clubs made every possible effort to win. Hamilton's defeat was owing to the heavy batting of the home team. The visitors' fielding was superb. Wood and Snider and MacGowan and Baker were the opposing points, and both pitchers were batted freely and hard, but the Alerts' hits were more opportune, scoring eight earned runs. That pair of three-baggers by Sippi in the first and second innings were daisies, and Morrison and Hynd touched the ball for a triple in the fifth. The hot tier that scorched Rathburn's hit was one that most people would try to dodge. Hamilton has been looking around for a pitcher for a long time. Failing Rusie, she got MacGowan, who was claimed to be a terrible failure. His work wasn't very much Rusie Saturday, and Hamilton's hope was somewhat shattered by London's victory. Albert Wood was no mystery to the Hams, but he did better than MacGowan, though Mac had far better support.

It was the kind of game that made the spectators perspire very freely, because the result was in doubt all the way through. The Alerts had a cinch on it in the third, but the glorious uncertainty of the game was again demonstrated. The six runs that that inning were made after two men were out. After Snyder had fouled out Dr. Wood made a single, Mertsch fanned the air. Rathburn knocked out a terrific fly to the center field fence and made three bases, scoring Dr. Wood. Then Delaney singled, A. Wood made a double, Strowger hit by the ball, and Sippi and Hynd received charities that forced in the fourth run. Snyder then smashed a double, scoring Strowger and Sippi. Hynd was cut off at the plate.

The Hams more than evened things up in the fifth, seventh and eighth, chiefly through a costly error by Morrison. In the eighth the Alerts went in to do or die. Strowger hit to Morrison, who was too far off his base to beat the runner. Strowger was soon at third, aided by a balk. Sippi struck out. Hynd singled for four balls, and Snyder singled, both coming home on Dr. Wood's timely double to center. Mertsch singled, but the lucky inning ended by Rathburn being thrown out and Delaney striking out.

Death of a Ball Player From Injuries Received in a Game.
