Chatham's Wagon Works to Start Up Again Next Week—New Departure in a Tilsburg Sunday School—A Close Call.

The Chatham Wagon Works start up again on or about Jan. 6, 1896.

Clinton inaugurates early closing on Jan. 4—the town bell will be rung at 9 o'clock.

It is the intention of the Learnington high school trustees to ask the Minister of Education to open the school early in January.

Chief Bullard has tendered his resignation as chief of the Windham fire brigade. Mr. Thomas H. Manuel was appointed to the position.

Judge Woods, of Stratford, has decided that the assessment of property fronting on granolithic pavements cannot be raised to pay for the walks unless a bylaw is passed.

Mr. F. H. Linley, teacher at Cedar Springs, has been presented with a beautiful ring and complimentary address. He goes to Toronto to resume his studies at the university.

Dresden school board accepted the resignation of Miss Bell King and Miss Rudd. Miss Wannamaker, Dresden, and Miss Jellie, Camden, were appointed to fill the vacancies.

A new departure in the Tilsburg Methodist Sunday school is the institution of an orchestra consisting of two violins and a cornet, played by Mr. Johnson and his son and daughter.

Harry See, who was arrested at Dresden for refusing to surrender the money and books of the C.O.O.F., at the expiration of his term of imprisonment, has been sentenced to two months' imprisonment.

George Richardson, one of the best known of Chatham's citizens, died at St. Joseph's Hospital there on Christmas morning. Mr. Richardson has been suffering for some weeks from a complication of diseases.

On Friday, Charles David of Dover, was sawing wood and his little brother was splitting, when the latter let the axe slip from his hands. Charles was struck on the head, receiving a frightful wound several inches in length.

The Wallaceburg town council has disposed of \$18,000 of debentures for something less than 4-1-4 per cent. The purchaser was a Toronto broker.

The council had the offer of 4 per cent, but since that war was in one of the counties, the village fathers are a little proud of the bargain.

Arthur Holden, the boy who alleges that he was cruelly dealt with at the hands of his employer, Thomas George, of Dresden, was on Thursday removed to Toronto by a representative of the Barnardo Institution. The boy, though able to be round is still suffering considerably from his many wounds.

The merriness of Rev. E. L. Steeves' Christmas was enhanced by the pleasure of a twenty-mile drive through slush and mud. The occasion was a wedding, and such events recognize neither bad weather or bad roads.

The principal parties were those, Rightly and Miss Mary Cox, all of Raleigh, and never a bride and groom had a happier Christmas—Chatham Banner.

As the L.E. and D. R. train was leaving the Learnington station Friday evening, W. A. Pink was in one of the coaches bidding goodbye to some friends. In attempting to leave he fell between two coaches and was rescued by the baggage man after the train had gone some distance. Fortunately he is not seriously hurt, but had not been discovered he would have had to let go, and would have met a horrible death.

Mrs. Christina Bell, widow of the late John Bell, one of the early settlers in Sarnia, came to this town in 1833 or '34, died on Saturday, aged 73 years. Deceased was married in 1835 to John Bell, whose death occurred about 28 years ago. Of the family there survive Henry Bell, of Windsor; Mrs. Alex. Crawford, of Duluth; Mrs. D. McMaster, Mrs. Wm. Williams, and Miss Maggie Bell, with the last-named of whom she lived since the death of Mr. Bell. Deceased was born at Leith, Scotland, in 1818.

An interesting event took place Thursday evening, at Ingersoll, when Miss Cella Day, daughter of Ezra Day, was married to James E. Ferguson, at the groom's residence, Canterbury street. The ceremony was performed by Rev. Mr. McGregor, of Tilsonburg, assisted by Rev. E. H. Rutt, Ingersoll. Miss Charlotte Ferguson, sister of the groom, and Miss Dollie Waterhouse, niece of the bride, acted as bridesmaids.

While W. A. Ferguson, of Woodstock, assisted the groom. Both of the contracting parties are very popular.
