FINE AND WARM—THOSE MISSING SHOWERS PROMISED.

DARING ROBBERY.

Some \$400 Worth of Jewelry Stolen from a Hamilton Store.

Hamilton, June 10.—One of the boldest robberies that has ever taken place in Hamilton was committed between 12 and 1 o'clock on Saturday. The victim was Mr. W. E. Parker, King street east. His loss, he reports, will amount to about \$400. He locked up the store about 12 o'clock and went to dinner, leaving his stock in the cases, and took no precautions against thieves further than lock the front and back doors.

When he returned at 1 o'clock he found the door locked, but on entering he discovered that a large quantity of his stock was gone. Among the articles missing are: Fifty-eight gem gold rings, 15 plain gold rings, 9 plated rings, 1 gold chain, 2 new gold watches and 1 silver watch. He also reported that two gold watches which had been left with him for repairs were stolen. The back door was not disturbed, and the thief must have left through the front entrance.

Parker has a partner named J. Bookie, and the two do business under the name of the American Optical Company. Bookie travels nearly all the time, and was away on Saturday. The case is surrounded with mystery.

—Messrs. A. R. Galpin, R. Whitton and Wm. Loughrey, secretary, representing the Chosen Friends, have returned from a two days' trip to Niagara Falls and Buffalo. They have completed arrangements for a grand three days' excursion to those places on July 31.

—Yesterday afternoon Mr. Richard Northey, employed at Belton's lumber yard, met with a painful accident. He was unloading some logs from his wagon, when he accidentally let one drop, resulting in his fourth finger being smashed to a pulp. Mr. Northey will be disabled for some time.

—The following London members of the L. O. F. are elected as delegates to the Supreme Court meeting of the Forsters to be held in London, England, in July: R. Thos. Martin, J. H. Galpin, well Fleming (now in Toronto), and Frank Adams. Besides these three elected delegates, Messrs T. G. Davey, Supreme treasurer, and B. W. THE MACLEODS.
For more than a century the Macleods have been leading men in the Church of Scotland. Three of them have presided as moderator over the General Assembly, and the fourth, the Rev. Dr. Donald Macleod, of Glasgow, has just been chosen for that office. QUITE AGREEABLE.

THE CONVALESCENT HOME.
The postponed meeting of the Convalescent Home was held on Thursday last, and several matters of importance were disposed of. Among the gifts gratefully acknowledged were a handsome sideboard from Mrs. Smart, and carpet from Mrs. Cleghorn; preserves, etc., from Miss Whitehead, Mrs. De la Hooke, Miss Hamilton, Mrs. Bullen; money—\$2 from Miss C. Macklem, of Toronto; 50 cents from Mrs. Macbeth; \$10 from the Ministering Children's League of the Memorial Church; and \$5 from Mr. Beattie towards expenses of Lizzie Rice. Mrs. St. John Hyttenrauch having applied on the latter's behalf for an extension of her term of residence for three months more, in addition to the seven months already spent by the poor girl at the Convalescent Home, the condition of the leg being such that the artificial limb could not be fitted to it for some months longer, the request was granted, with the understanding that as the amount necessary for the purchase of the artificial limb had been provided already, further contributions should be allotted for her support, meanwhile, and it is hoped that friends will help Mrs. Hyttenrauch to fulfill her pledge to the treasurer of the home. A sad case of face cancer, sent from the hospital, had to be declined, it being unanimously decided that medical treatment in the hospital was what was necessary. The applicant was sick and penniless and desisted by her husband, and consequently left the city. Her husband, it would not have been fair to other inmates to have given her admission. Otherwise her poverty would have been so hard on the admission to the Convalescent Home.
