Joseph Lamb, an old and well-known resident, met with a tragic death of 11 o'clock Saturday morning on the farm of James McGreor, near Tempo. His friends ran to his assistance, but death had resulted immediately. He never moved or spoke after reaching the ground. The remains were sent to Paris for interment. He was about 76 years of age.

MURDERED BY TRAMPS.

L'Original, June 23.—Etienne Seguin, a 5-year-old boy, whose parents live at Gatheneau Point, got hold of a loaded gun in his home, and pulling the trigger, shot a little companion named Edward Letemps. The bullet struck young Letemps behind the ear and caused instant death.

High Handed!

A Deputy Returning Officer Causes the Arrest

Of a Respectable Railway Man for Voting on His Own Name.

No Provision for Ball and the Citizen Must Stay in Jail All Day—Action for Damages.

The polling booth had scarcely been opened this morning before one of Franklin Wright's appointees distinguished himself by an act almost unparalleled in connection even with the iniquitous Dominion Franchise Act.

By a warrant signed by E. M. Fleming, deputy returning officer of No. 16 polling booth, a respectable citizen was committed to jail. And to make matters worse, there is no provision in the statute for bail, and he must lie in jail all day, as the commitment reads "until 5 p.m."

The citizen who has had to submit to the public disgrace of arrest in his own neighborhood, to a ride in the police patrol through the public streets in broad daylight, to be dragged from pillar to post, from police station to jail, is Mr. Ira Collins, a well-known railway man of twenty years' standing. Mr. Collins is a yardman, and lives at 552 York street.

He attempted to vote at subdivision 16, and was immediately arrested by the constable in charge, and handed over to the officers in the patrol wagon, which arrived shortly afterwards.

Friends, including Thomas S. Hobbs, M.P.P., offered to identify him, but Mr. Wright's deputy would not permit him to enter the polling booth.

The wagon brought Mr. Collins to the police station, but the commitment read "jail," and to jail he had to go.

Ald. J. W. Jones and Mr. Hobbs followed Mr. Collins. At the police station they secured Mr. James Magee, Q.C., the Crown Attorney, and the sheriff's quarters at the court house presented an animated scene as Lawyer Dignan argued that Mr. Collins should not be detained. He pointed out that Mr. Fleming's name was attached to the commitment, and that Mr. Magee—That's so.

The act was thoroughly overhauled, but no provision could be found for bail in such a case.

Mr. Magee then went and had a consultation with Judge Edward Elliott, who returned shortly and stated that nothing could be done, and that Mr. Collins would have to remain in jail until the time specified.

"I think," said Mr. Magee, "it is a most outrageous and high-handed act on the facts, as I understand them, that this man actually went in to vote in his own name, and was being disturbed the peace in any way whatsoever."

It was found, however, that Mr. Collins could obtain a writ for damages against Mr. Fleming for alleged false arrest, and one was immediately made out.

It will be served during the day and prosecuted to the utmost. Heavy damages will be claimed.

"We have to have to enlarge the jail if men are going to be brought in and voting for themselves," said Jailer Kelly.

The affair has created intense excitement among the railway men, and it will not do the Tupper cause any good.

IT WAS A FAILURE.

Tupper's Visit to Hamilton Injures His Party—Poor Contrast With the Liberals.

Hamilton, June 23.—Saturday night's demonstration by the Conservatives fell so far below their expectations, especially when contrasted with the crowds that were attracted to Dundurn Park by the Liberals, that the confidence of the Tories is much less noticeable today, and many who were sanguine of victory last week now admit that defeat is probable.

The Reformers, on the other hand, are more certain than ever of success at the polls, and will be woefully disappointed if it does not come their way this time.

In Wentworth, too, the chances of Thomas Bain beating the Conservative nominee, A. H. Pettit, are much brighter, and his re-election will not be surprising.

OUTWITTED BY A GIRL.

Looks Himself in a Telegraph Tower and Wires for Help.

Pittsburg, Pa., June 23.—Two tramps attempted to break into the Western Pennsylvania Railroad office at Har-marville, last night. One of them pointed a revolver at Miss Alice Mehaffey, the telegraph operator in charge, and threatened to kill her if she did not hand out all the money in the drawer. The girl slammed the tower window shut in the tramps' face and telegraphed to the nearest stations on both sides of Har-marville for help. One operator signalled a fast train, and told the crew to stop at Har-marville. Officers were also sent, but the tramps, realizing that the girl had telegraphed for help, fled.

BOUND TO DIE.

Determined Suicide at Berlin—Chased and Captured, but Too Late To Save His Life.

Berlin, Ont., June 22.—A curious case of suicide, peculiar on account of the determination which characterized the act, took place here Saturday. The victim of his own rash act is a young German, named Joseph Herman, a bricklayer's and mason's laborer. He was very erratic in his habits, and was thought not to be entirely responsible. He boarded at Seibert's boarding house, on Queen street, and when some of the other boarders, including his brother, went to his room Saturday afternoon to see why he stayed so long, they caught him in the act of administering a dose of Paris green to himself.

He was taken to the hospital, and was made for Dr. Lackner's office, across the street, the other men dragging Herman with them. The doctor ran to a back room for his stomach pump, and while the others were not looking the would-be suicide made a bolt for the street. Up Queen street he ran, followed shortly by the doctor and the others in a buggy. He, however, managed to elude his pursuers, a small delay being occasioned in hitching a horse, and ran for nearly a mile out towards the town limits. Finally the doctor and the others came upon him sitting under a tree groaning terribly. When he saw them he jumped up again and dashed off in the direction of Bridgeport, but he was overtaken by the doctor, and fell before going far. When the doctor tried to use the stomach pump Herman fought and kicked like a madman. At last they got his mouth open by prying it with a broom handle, and the pump was applied to the man's mouth. Everything was done to save his life, but he died at an early hour next morning in great agony. The suicide was a single man, and it is believed the reason he took poison was because of a love affair. He had frequently threatened to take his life, once because the cook at a hotel where he was boarding refused to go to a dance with him. He belonged to the 6 Company, Twenty-ninth Battalion.

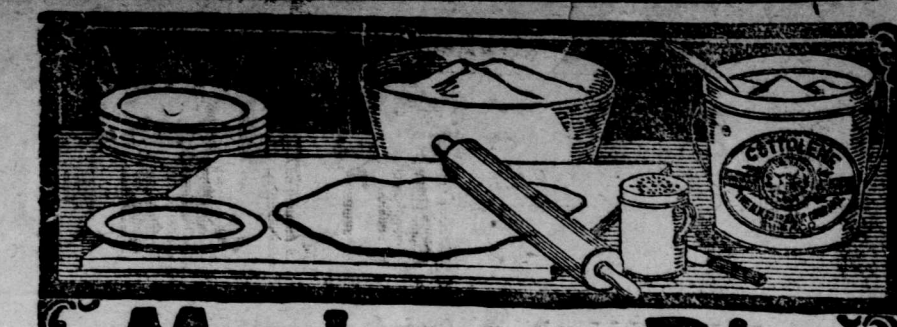

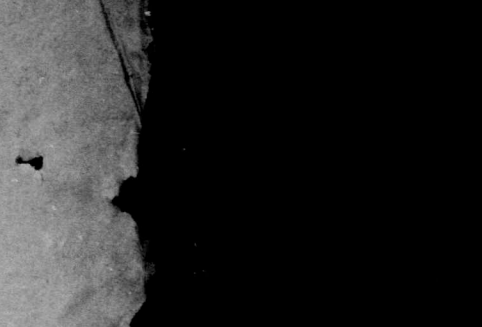
