—The police commissioners met on Saturday. They awarded the tender for overcoats and capes to J. & D. Ryall at \$21 and \$5 respectively. M. J. Denton, M.P., the work of making undercoats at \$14.50, and trousers at \$6.50. The estimates for the year were passed. They are the same as last year—over \$26,000.

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**CITY CHURCH CIRCLES.**

Interesting Events in the Different Religious Institutions.

**Hon. David Mills Speaks—Endeavor**

**Sunday the World Over—Blessing the Candles—Bishop**

**Hawkins—Special Singing, Etc.**

Yesterday was "Endeavor" Sunday throughout the civilized world, and in every country Christian tongues were celebrating the thirtieth anniversary of the Y. P. S. C. E. In that short time the society has grown in size and importance until it is now a recognized adjunct in almost every church, and its influence for good is felt everywhere among the young.

The fact was generally mentioned throughout the city churches.

Victoria Hall was well filled on Sunday afternoon with young men to hear an address by Hon. David Mills, M.P. Prof. Harrison occupied the chair, and at the conclusion of the speech delivered a few well appreciated remarks. Secretary Sayer offered a prayer, and the Black Jennie Lind (Miss Bishop) sang effectively. Mr. Mills' address was on "Character Building." The honorable gentleman handled his subject with his usual ability and with profit to his hearers.

Since the Rev. Thomas Cullen assumed the pastorate of the Askin Street Methodist Church there has been great progress both in its temporal and spiritual affairs. Thirty-six new members were added yesterday morning as a result of the revival services in progress there. The celebrated Bishop Hawkins preached two powerful sermons.

Hundreds of candles, contributed by the members of the church, were blessed yesterday at St. Peter's Cathedral, by the Bishop of London. This is the usual ceremony of Candlemas Day and was witnessed by a large congregation.

Bishop Hawkins, of Chatham, will give the thrilling story of his slave, life at the Askin Street Methodist Church to-night.

At Adelaide Street Baptist Church special services were commenced last evening, led by the pastor, Rev. D. M. Miles, aided by prominent members. It is the intention to continue these meetings (Saturday excepted) throughout the week, beginning with a song service each evening at 7:45.

The musical service in the Queen's Avenue Methodist Church last night was one of the finest heard there for years, the chorus being all well balanced, while the solo singing of the Misses Hartson and Fowler was exceptionally good. Mr. Fetherston is to be congratulated on the success of these young ladies, who are all his pupils.

The Bishop of Huron preached at All Saints and Epiphany churches, Toronto, yesterday. To-night he lectures at All Saints' school room, on his trip to the Holy Land, and to-morrow night delivers a missionary address at the annual open meeting of the Wycliffe College Mission Society on Tuesday evening.

The missionary work among the French in the Province of Quebec was dwelt upon at St. Paul's Cathedral on Sunday evening by Rev. R. F. Taylor, of Montreal. He related many interesting incidents in connection with the work, and stated that there were at present 50,000 English-speaking French in that Province. The funds which Mr. Taylor is collecting were not, he said, to send missionaries into the various fields, but to supply accommodation for those who had voluntarily become members of the Anglican Church.

The new Christian Mission on Wellington street south was opened yesterday afternoon by Rev. T. G. Fowler, M.A. This branch of the denomination here promises to flourish exceedingly.

A series of evangelistic services, commencing to-night, will be held all this week at the Talbot Street Baptist Church.

The First Congregational Church was crowded at both services yesterday. Rev. Dr. Wild of Toronto occupied the pulpit, in the morning speaking on "The Blind Miller and His Mill" and in the evening "Can a Man Die Before His Time?" The choir sang special music on both occasions.

Rev. M. P. Talling preached an instructive sermon to his flock in the St. James' Presbyterian Church last night from St. Matthew, xvi, 13 to 16. A feature of the service was the delightful singing of "Throw Out the Life-Line" by Mrs. (Rev.) W. Patterson, Toronto. On Wednesday night next Mr. Talling will continue his progressive series of lectures on "The Pilgrim's Progress," dealing with his subject from Vanity Fair to the silver mine. On Thursday night a concert will be given in the church, in which Mrs. Patterson will be the leading singer. Other good talent has also been secured.

The good result of the special evangelistic services now being conducted in the Centennial Methodist Church by the pastor, Rev. Joseph Philip, and Evangelist Patrick and wife, was shown Sunday when about 40 adult converts and about many professing juveniles were received into church membership. The meetings will be continued on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday evenings of this week, and next Sunday evening another reception service will be held. In the morning the rite of baptism will be administered. On Tuesday afternoon the recently organized Women's Auxiliary Missionary Society in connection with the church will hold its first meeting.

The Memorial Church was crowded at both services Sunday. In the morning the pulpit was occupied by Rev. R. F. Taylor, of the Sabrevois Mission, Montreal. His sermon was very interesting. In the evening Rev. Principal Miller, of Huron College, preached a scholarly discourse.

Next Sunday Rev. J. P. Rice, of Alma College, St. Thomas, will conduct the services in Dundas Street Central Methodist Church.

Miss Carrie Chambers, a respected member of Dundas Street Methodist Church choir, who was recently very ill in Toronto, has returned to the city, but she is not yet able to take her former place.

Sunday morning the ordinance of the Lord's Supper was administered in Dundas Street Methodist Church. A large number of young converts—the result of the recent revival in the congregation—participated in the service for the first time.

The confirmation class at St. James' Church, South London, is being largely attended. The rite will probably be administered by the bishop on Palm Sunday.

Rev. W. S. Rainsford, D. D., the
