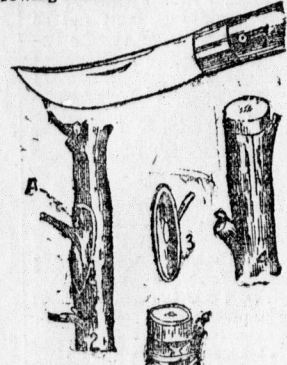

BUDS AND BUDDING.

Illustrated Directions That Will Be Useful During the Budding Season.

Buds are classed as leaf buds or fruit buds. Leaf buds produce either leaves or branches. They differ in form from fruit buds in being in most cases longer and more pointed in the same species. In the early stages of their formation and growth all buds are but leaf buds. Thus, for example, on a young shoot of the cherry or plum of one season's growth the buds are all leaf buds. The next spring a part of these produce new shoots, and others are transformed into fruit buds that will bear fruit the following season. In selecting buds from one variety to be inserted under the bark of another, cut off shoots of the present summer's growth that are sufficiently matured to have well developed buds. Cut off the leaves except enough of the leaf stalk by which to handle the bud. The bud to be inserted in the axil of each leaf stalk. The stalk to receive the bud should be young and in a vigorous growing condition.



VARIOUS STAGES IN THE PROCESS OF BUDDING.

Make two incisions in the tender bark in the form of the letter T and raise the edges of the bark with the handle of the budding knife to receive the bud. Cut the bud from the shoot with a sharp knife so as to remove the bud entire with the little piece of bark, clip the bark off square at the top of the bud to fit the incision, hold the bud by the short leaf stalk and slip it down into the opening prepared for it, binding the cut with some soft ligature to keep the whole in place, leaving the bud itself and the leaf stalk uncovered.

In a general way, budding may be done at any time when the bark will peel and the buds are sufficiently matured on the new wood. The only tool needed is a sharp, thin-bladed knife. A regular budding knife such as is for sale at any store where horticultural tools are kept is shown at 1 in the illustration. At A in Fig. 2 is shown how the bud is cut out; 3 shows the underside of the bud as it is cut out; 4, how the incisions are made, and 5 the bud inserted and the whole wrapped securely. The cut is usually made about half an inch above the bud to be removed, and the cut is made down to three-quarters of an inch below the bud, though it may be made shorter. A small portion of the wood is removed with the bark, so as not to injure the root of the bud. Make smooth cuts; fit the bud to the incision as closely as possible and wrap securely, so as to exclude air and water.

Twenty-five Hardy Roses.

A Missouri correspondent in Gardening, who furnishes the following list in the order of his preference, says in explanation: By the term "hardy" reference is not made to any particular class, like the hybrid perpetuals, which are all hardy with us, but to any and all that stand easily throughout the winters in this section without serious harm to their growing and flowering vitality.

These roses have not been selected solely for the size and excellence of their flowers, but for their general utility: La France, pink; Mme. Charles Wood (Dinsmore), red; Clothilde Soupert, white and carmine; Duchesse de Brabant (Comtesse de Labarthe), pink; Hermosa, pink; General Washington, red; General Jacqueminot, red; Cels, bluish white; Mme. Masson, red; Anna de Diesbach, pink; Paul Neyron, pink; Ulrich Brunner, red; Prince Camille de Rohan, dark crimson; Mme. Gabrielle Luitet, pink; Mrs. John Laing, pink; Marshall P. Wilder, red; Coquette des Alpes, white; Coquette des Blancs, white; Perfection des Blancs, white; Mme. Plantier, white; Victor Verdier, pink; Magna Charta, pink; Baltimore Belle, climbing, bluish; Queen of the Prairies, climbing, rosy red; Seven Sisters, climbing, bluish.

Fruit Notes.

The Crescent strawberry has a great many advocates. The Ohmer is a promising new variety among blackberries. There is nothing else so good for covering hotbeds as glass. There seems to be plenty of evidence in favor of the Crosby peach. There is little doubt as to its hardness, but it is excellent in other respects.

Of gooseberries, try Red Jacket and Columbus, says The Rural New Yorker. Of currants, try Fay's Prolific and Cherry; Victoria is a good late sort. Of red raspberries, try Outhbert, Golden Queen, Shaffer and Royal Church. Of blackberries, try Southgate, Hillborn and Ohio. Of blackberries, try Minnewaski, Lovett's Best, Erie and Taylor.

The number of pears allowed to grow on young trees should be limited by judicious and early thinning out of the embryo fruit.

QUEEN ANNE COTTAGE.

Chaste and Pleasant Design For a \$2,800 Dwelling.

Unless great care is taken in the selection of the plans the cost of a building frequently exceeds the first stipulated limit of cost, and the result is disappointing to the owner and unpleasant for all concerned. Queen Anne houses cost more than colonial or hybrid designs of the same area of plans, especially where elaborate details are required.

quired. Here is a neat little house which may be classed as a simple treatment of a Queen Anne cottage. All the room is used to good advantage, and the building is well finished throughout, with a cellar underneath the whole structure and a good furnace which sends ample heat to all the principal rooms.

The foundation walls are of stone laid up in cement mortar. Above the foundation walls the structure is of wood. Side walls and roofs are sheathed with tongued and grooved stuff and covered with waterproof sheathing paper, clapboarded in the first story, with side walls in the second story and all gables and roofs shingled with best quality white pine shingles. There is a wide veranda across the front and along one side of the hall. This veranda is roofed by extending the main roof of the building over the same. The lower ends of the rafters rest upon a strong plate, which is supported by neat columns. The keeping with the style of architecture. The space between the columns is ornamented by a railing in harmony with the whole.

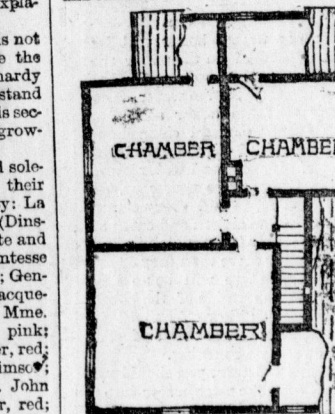
In the first story are three large rooms in addition to the staircase hall, which is separated from the parlor by a sliding door 4½ feet wide. The parlor in the same man-

ner is shut off from the dining room, thus making it possible to utilize the entire space in the parlor, hall and dining room when desired. The special feature of the hall is the handsome staircase, with a pretty stained glass window over the lower landing. Stained glass may be pretty without being expensive. Amber colored glass, with small corner pieces of ruby, is a simple combination, but very rich in interior effect.

The staircase and all woodwork in the hall are of selected dry ash. The parlor and dining room are finished in chestnut, selected for its beauty of grain, all thoroughly kiln dried. The floors in both stories are of yellow pine, as is also the kitchen and woodwork. The doors in the first story are of ash and chestnut finish. All woodwork in the first story is filled with a good wood filler and varnished two coats with best coach varnish and rubbed smooth. The woodwork and doors in the second story are of white pine painted in two coats. The inside walls and ceilings in both stories are hard finished on two coats of plaster, with ornamental corner pieces and cornices.

The exterior of this cottage is well broken by gables and dormer windows, which, with the long sloping line of roof which extends over the veranda, give a most pleasing appearance. The roofs are painted a venetian red, the shingles in the second story and clapboards in first story a light drab, with dark drab trimmings, with moldings and sash picked out in bright red. The effect of the whole is chaste and pleasing to people of refinement. If so desired, a comfortable bathroom could be added in the second story at small cost.

The hardware in the first story is of bronze; in the second story bronzed iron with jet knobs. This house, with heating, etc., and bathroom complete, would cost about \$2,800. Without the bathroom it could be built for \$2,400.

The advantages of money invested, two houses treated as one structure will cost less than two detached dwellings and afford an opportunity of securing a more imposing and attractive exterior. When erected upon two full city lots, it allows greater space for light and air on all sides. Furthermore, the design may be arranged so that each house shall have separate entrances and quite as much individuality as detached dwellings. They also possess some advantages over the latter. LEGAL QUERIES.

MOUNT BRYDGES.—A boy under age takes a paper for a short time. After time has expired the paper is sent on. Can the publishers compel boy to pay for what is sent on after time has expired? **ANS.—No.**

MILDMAY.—Can a compel B to move out of the corner on his side of the fence owned by A, stones which have been put there after A has forbidden him? Also can A make B move the stones that were there when B bought the farm? **ANS.—Not upon the facts. B owns the property on his side of the fence and has a right to use it as he sees fit.**

PERL.—A dies possessed of a farm in intestate and leaving his widow B and infant and adult children. In his lifetime he gave a mortgage to B which with interest now amounts to more than the value of the farm. B now wishes to sell under the mortgage. Will it be sufficient to serve notices of sale on the infant and adult children and when the time in notices mentioned elapses unheeded to proceed with the sale? **ANS.—No.** An administrator must be appointed and the official guardian must look after the interests of the infant. An action in the High Court for foreclosure is necessary, consult a solicitor.

KINGSTON.—A mutual fire insurance company has made a call on a three year policy, for \$79. Can they make me pay, as they have failed and cannot give me value for my money? My policy is now starting on the third year premium and not each year. Can I cancel policy and not pay the premium? **ANS.—No.** 2.—Will I take any notice of calls: did not owe them anything up to the failure? **ANS.—You are liable to contribute to the extent of your note or undertaking for the winding up of the company. Whether you should now or not is a question upon which you had better consult a lawyer. The fact that you owed no call or assessment at the date of the failure does not necessarily relieve you from liability.**

WEST DULUTH, MINN.—Is the will legal of a father who leaves one child out and does not mention his name in the will, and can that child come in for a share of his father's property and break the will? **ANS.—The will is legal.** A man can legally will his property to whom he pleases, and if he does not mention his name in the will, or to some of them only, is no ground of itself for setting aside the will. That one child is not mentioned in the will might, coupled with other facts, be evidence of fraud and improper influence, which would be a ground for having the will declared void. It is not, however, the fact that the testator has been by fraud induced to make his will in a certain way, which would justify the court in setting it aside as void. If the will stands, the child of course gets no share of his father's estate. Your former question did not put the matter clearly before us.

WIDOW.—My husband died and left 50 acres, the homestead, to his son, and 50 acres to his daughter, each having to give me so much, and the son had the use of all the personal property during my lifetime for keeping me. Has he a right to keep the money and say it is for my board, or has he to board me for the use of the personal property? If he has no claim on the money, can I collect it or will it be gone for the years that are gone by, as I have got but very little yet? If the farm were sold, could I still collect my allowance? **ANS.—Your rights depend upon the will, without seeing which a definite opinion cannot be given. Upon your statement, however, you are entitled to whatever the son and daughter are to give you, in addition to your maintenance, and may of course collect it or dispose of it by your will. The sale of the farm would not apparently affect your allowance, which is a charge on the farm. You had better consult a solicitor.**
