QUEER TO US

But Happy and Well-Behaved and in Every Way Exemplary

The Doukhobors at a Meal-Their Care of Birdsand Animals-Their Passion to Learn English and Become Good Canadians.

Lally Bernard, in a most interesting communication to the Toronto Globe, tells of a recent visit which she made to the Doukhobor settlement, north of Yorkton, N.W.T. She found the people zealously learning the English language and ardently desirous that their children should be instructed as are native Canadians. They send their little ones to a school presided over by an educated young lady from Kingston, The Doukhobors are Quakers, they are vegetarians and strong and healthy. Here are some of the experiences of Lally Bernard among

When we marveled at them letting the little gophers and blackbirds live unharmed to destroy their crops and the fruit of their labor, they simply smiled and said, "God gives them hunger even as we hunger; it is not well to kill that which God has en-dowed with life." Living in their villages as pets we would find wild geese, ducks, storks and even cormorants, and the prairie chickens ran hither and thither among the vegetables in their cottage gardens. The great fields of oats and wheat were guarded by bands of brightly dressed women and children who tried to scare away the great rapacious bands of with what sounded in the distance like most musical cries. Pretty sorry work it was during the wet weather which kept us house-bound for days. In early morning the smoke from tiny fires was seen curling its way through the mist, as they tried to dry their dripping garments by its warmth. Sometimes wooden rattles were carved by the boys, and I fear the birds learned to have a decided contempt for these toys which contained neither powder nor shot.

We had a most charming afternoon and evening at the house of one of the Doukhoborsti, who was a particular friend of Mrs. B—'s, and the novelty of a real "Doukhobo luncheon will live long in my memory. On our arrival we found the family scattering fresh sand before the door to obliterate the traces of three days of heavy rain, and the neighbors all came forward in their gala dresses to welcome us to our host house. was rather fearful as to what we might be expected to swallow in the way of a vegetarian menu, but a more delicious repast I have never enjoyed. Perhaps the prairie air and cordial hospitality had something to do with our appetite. but the delicate fried potatoes, and the "curd dumplings" made with delicately fluted edges, and cooked in melted butter, were really excellent. Then came great heaping platters of thin pancakes, cut into V-shaped pieces, laid one above the other, and served with butter and "smeetana" or sour cream, which is one of their greatest delicacies. Tea, the best I have ever had the pleasure of drinking, was brought in tumblers, and very slightly seasoned with cinnamon, our hostess apologizing for the absence of lemon; Vegetable few. soup, tasting like the German potato when I met him.

part of the country. DOUKHOBORS AT THE TABLE. All this was served with the most immaculate dishes, and the table was covered with the whitest of cloths, with a scarlet border and deep edging of knitted lace. We had to open our own tea-basket for knives and forks, of which they had none. When knives are needed they use their own "jack knives" of finest Russian steel, but "fingers were made before forks," and when the wooden spoon is not effect-ual as a means of conveying the food to the mouth, fingers are substituted, and one long, narrow table napkin, which reached the entire round of the table, is used assiduously. I am not sure that this is not an "idea," the constant slipping to the ground of table napkins in civilized society is often complained of. I found that Doukhobor meals, like the German, took a long time to complete, but there are practically only dinner at .1 o'clock and a very late supper, breakfast being eaten usually in the most casual way-just a piece of dry bread, and a bunch of radishes fresh from the garden, and a glass of "kvas" constituting their morning meal, which is

not taken when they first rise. The idea that tea is "made" in a Russian "samovar" is erroneous, for the samovar is simply a hot water kettle which has a charcoal fire to keep the water at an even temperature, and the tea-pot stands on the top, kept warm by the heat of the water. The one peculiarity of their making seems to be that the leaves never stand for more than a minute or two in water; the rest of the time the leaves are left to keep warm with the water drained off, and water is only added when it is really needed.



Early in the afternoon of February 24, the hail of pumice began to fall upon doomed Pompeii, the pieces averaging about the size of a walnut, together with torrents of rain. It must then have been almost too late Liver Pills as the greatest regulators for anybody who remained in the city to get away. Repeated shocks of earthquake contributed to the horror of the scene, incidentially demolishing the bridge over the Sarno and so shutting off escape in that direction. Mean-while, rivers of pumice mixed with flowed down the slope of Vesuvius on the other side and overwhelmed

the neighboring town of Herculaneum. The pumice fell in Pompeli until the streets of the city were covered eight to ten feet deep with it. Its wight broke in the roofs of many of the houses, and the destruction of lives must have already been frightful. Nevertheless, many of the people still survived, seeking refuge in cellars and other such places of retreat. They must have imagined that there was still hope when, early in the morning of the next day (February 25), there came a great shock, and ashes began

the rain. Though day had arrived, it grew darker than ever, if possible, a cloud of frightful blackness settling down over the land, while the lightning and thunder were appalling. Shocks followed speck, and the survivors must be start have concluded that their least at last have concluded that their last hour was at hand. Such was in truth the case. The storm of ashes lasted nearly all day long; they drifted in through the windows of the houses and suffocated all who remained alive.
They covered the whole city with a They covered the whole city with a sheet of death six to seven feet thick.

Thus was completed the destruction of Pomoeii. If the estimate of fatalities above quoted be fairly correct, the loss of life was not more than one-third as great as during the recent hurricane at Galveston, whose terrors may be said to have fairly equalled those of this ancient catastrophe, though so different in kind. When it was all over the roofs of many of the houses still emerged above the volcanic debris which had overwhelmed the city. Herculaneum, however, had wholly disappeared under the streams of mud, 65 feet deep in spots, which had flowed This mud, heing a sort of natural concrete, soon hardened in stone, which is today of such solidity as to make excavating work extremel
