CONFERENCE DID IT

Labor Dispute Involving 40,000 Garment Workers Amicably Settled.

New York, Jan. 10.—A virtual settlement was reached yesterday of the bitter controversy for shorter hours that for many months has been waged between the garment cutters and the clothing manufacturers of the United States. An amicable settlement of the question, which involved about 40,000 men, was reached through the medium of the committee appointed by the recent conference of the National Civic Federation in this city.

The garment cutters are given an 8½-hour day. Toronto, Ont., Jan. 10.—A deputation representing societies engaged in social reform work waited upon Hon. Mr. Latchford to ask that the labor bureau system be extended to include agencies in cities and manufacturing centers throughout the province. It was believed that the plan outlined would enable many unfortunate persons in cities to return to the farm. Mr. Latchford promised careful consideration.

Facine, Wis., Jan. 10.—There was a light here over the acceptance of \$50,000 from Andrew Carnegie for a public library building. The labor unions of the city have presented a petition in opposition. The Woman's Club unanimously adopted a resolution strenuously urging the council to accept the gift.

Dubois, Pa., Jan. 10.—Eight hundred employees at Adrian and 600 employees at the Florence mines of the Rochester and Pittsburgh Coal and Iron Company, are on strike. The men are required to push cars left on the main track at the headings to the rooms in which they work. They claim this work should be done by mules.

Cincinnati, Jan. 9.—Joseph H. Bates, jun., a well-known young newspaper man of this city, who was connected with the Cincinnati Commercial Tribune, died today from a tumor of the stomach.

Windsor, Jan. 9.—The death occurred at Leamington Tuesday night of Walter Wigle, from typhoid fever and congestion of the lungs. He was a brother of John and Eliza Wigle, proprietors of the International Hotel, Windsor.
