New York, March 26.-Earl Grey, before sailing for England, gave the Associated Press an interview concerning Cecil Rhodes, the earl having received cablegrams from South Africa which led him to believe that Mr. Rhodes had but a few days to live. Lord Grey knew the famous South Afconduct, was released on payment of said:


