## 1,600 YOUNG MEN AND WOMEN JOIN TO BATTLE SOCIAL WRONGS

Call To Enter Fight on Evils of City Heard When Interdenominational Union Is Organized at Meeting Thronged By Hundreds.

### PROBLEMS OF THE GIRL WORKERS DISCUSSED BY ONE SPEAKER

#### LEADERS IN NEW SOCIAL MOVEMENT

What is regarded by ministers and laymen as the most important business the religious bodies of the city have undertaken, transpired Monday night when 1,600 members of Young People's Societies banded themselves together, irrespective of denomination, with the object of getting into the thick of the fray in the fight upon sin as it is found on the streets, in the places where men live without family environment, among the foreigners, and in the community in general. These young people have pledged themselves to be active sentinels of the city's welfare. Numerically they form a regiment that would do honor to the militia department. What can they not accomplish by waging the good fight if they are earnest in their desire to get at the root of things? The union's promoters have high hopes that this regiment in the army of the King of Kings will carry its banners bravely and will be more than a show battalion.

At a mass meeting of all the young people's societies of the city, which was held in Talbot Street Baptist Church Monday night, the Interdenominational Union of Young People's Societies of the city of London was formed, and if the future of the organization can be judged from the enthusiasm shown by the 1,600 young people in attendance it will be of great benefit to the city.

#### Units the Young Workers.

Rev. G. F. B. Doherty, of St. Paul's Cathedral, conducted the devotional services at the opening of the meeting, and afterwards explained the object of the new union. The organization of such a society has been under consideration for some time, and the first steps in the movement were taken at the annual Epworth League rally in Askin Street Church last spring, and the committee appointed prepared a constitution. The object of the new society was to promote fraternal, inspiring and co-operative efforts on the part of the young people for the betterment of the city in general.

#### For a Better City.

Rev. W. R. McIntosh, who has been one of the leaders of the movement in this city, spoke on the subject, "What Can We Do For a Better City?" Mr. McIntosh said that he did not wish to say that London was in any special need of a clean-up, but that the problems of the city had lately come to the front, and if civilization was overthrown in time it would be wrecked in the cities. The loose morals of a city could not be corrected by a militant agitation, but by the earnest and silent work of

the young people banded together in one cause.

#### Study the Community.

Mr. McIntosh advocated that the new organization take up "Community Study." There were parts of the community where life was neglected and co-operative efforts are needed to combat the surroundings in these parts. "Take Dundas street on a Sunday night," said the speaker. "Those who will stay away from church service on a Sabbath evening will find the street thronged with young people. These

## COL. ROOSEVELT IN THE HOSPITAL; WOUND SERIOUS

Chicago Surgeons Report the Patient Weak, But Not in Immediate Danger.

### CAMPAIGN ADDRESSES WILL BE DROPPED

Rough Rider Will Be Taken to His Home at Oyster Bay When Able to Move.

Col. Roosevelt was shot last night at Milwaukee by a deranged man named Schrank, while entering his automobile to address a meeting. For particulars of the shooting see Page Nine of this issue.

[Canadian Press.] Chicago, Oct. 15.—Col. Roosevelt's wound is not a mere flesh wound, but is a serious wound in the chest, said a bulletin issued this afternoon by physicians at Mercy Hospital.

Chicago, Ill., Oct. 15.—The X-ray examination of the wound in Col. Roosevelt's breast located the bullet deep in the tissues, but at a safe distance from the lung, apparently. A telegram was at once sent to Mrs. Roosevelt in New York by the colonel's orders. It read:

"Present examination shows no further danger beside that of which you were informed from Milwaukee. Respiration good, pulse normal. Bullet in safe place. No blood expectorated."

Col. Roosevelt walked into the X-ray room of the hospital without assistance. He showed much interest in the preparations for the radiograph.

Schrank To Be Examined. Milwaukee, Wis., Oct. 15.—Schrank was taken to the district court at 10:30 o'clock this morning for preliminary examination. The action was taken on recommendation of District Attorney Zabel, who issued a warrant charging Schrank with shooting Col. Roosevelt with attempt to kill.

In Hospital Ten Days. Chicago, Oct. 15.—Dr. Murphy announces that Col. Roosevelt will be confined to the hospital for at least ten days.
