## INDORSES SAM. HUGHES

Middlesex W. C. T. U. Bans Oigarettes and Declares Against Militancy.

Resolutions deploring the increasing use of cigarettes; re-affirming the stand of the union in support of woman suffrage, believing that it would be an effective means of ridding the country of the liquor evil; and endorsing Hon. to be obtained to divert this money to Samuel Hughes for what the resolution styled his "courageous action," in prohibiting the use of liquors at the Petawawa camp, were passed at the annual convention of the Middlesex W. C. T. U., which met yesterday in the Presbyterian Church at Glencoe.

The last resolution expressed the view that untold harm was caused by the use of liquors in camps, military training schools and similar institutions, many young men drinking it for the first time in these places.

The licensed liquor trame was styled. "The home's avowed greatest enemy" in the suffrage resolution, which also contained a clause expressing the opinon that any "resort to violence or in timidation to win the desired end," would injure the cause of suffrage.

A Statement From the South Oxford Prohibition President.

To the Editor of The Advertiser: In the Ingersoll Chronicle of June 18, there appeared a letter as written by direction of the executive committee of the South Oxford Prohibition Association to the two candidates, Col. T. R. Mayberry and V. A. Sinclair, B.A., followed by the replies received.

In reference to these replies, I wish to

state that the answer received from Mr. Mayberry, though somewhat brief, is candid and frank, showing as it does that he stands as he always has stood, with us for the abolition of the liquor traffic. The letter received from Mr. Sinclair was evasive and indefinite, and contains statements that are incorrect and misleading, though they may not appear so to him, viewing them as he does from his own viewpoint. I have been a member of the executive of the Ontario Alliance for several years and in close touch with the leading temperance forces of the province, and know from my own persona experience that there has been no effort put forth by the temperance people or its leaders to drive their adherents to the support of the Reform party. The very fact that Mr. Sinclair makes such a statement indicates to me very clearly that he is not in harmony with the best progressive temperance sentiment of our province, and therefore not entitled to support of temperance electors.
