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BATTLE AND SIEGE CLOSELY RELATED

If Allies Win On Aisne, It Will
Help Antwerp Consid-
erably.

BOTH SIDES DESPERATE

If Antwerp Falls, Ineffective-
ness of Modern Fortifica-
tions Will Be Shown.

London, Oct. 9.—19:05 a.m.—So far as
England knows this morning, Antwerp,
the latest of the beleaguered cities of
Belgium, is still holding out against the
German onslaught. King Albert has
withdrawn from the city toward Ostend,
where the administration is now fully
established, but practically the entire
Belgian field army has remained to re-
sist, so long as possible, the fire of
the great German guns, the horrible
effects of which were made so plain at
Liege.

From the standpoint of those nations
opposing Germany, the hope was that
the defenders could hold out till the
allies delivered some decisive blow along
the battle line in France, which has
now almost reached the North Sea, and
taken in conjunction with the fighting,
which extends across the Belgian fron-
tier to the northward of Lille, makes a
gigantic front sprawling like a snake
half across Belgium and across practi-
cally all of Northeastern France.

Desperate Efforts

Though separate conflicts, the siege
of Antwerp and the battle of the Aisne
are thus becoming more and more
closely related, and both the Germans
and the allies are making the most
desperate efforts to crush each other
and smash through the ever-lengthening
front. The battle of the Aisne, which
is being fought on a front of 150 miles,
is contained within the great efforts to
drive a wedge through the region, and
the situation is stationary, though most
violent fighting continues.

If Antwerp falls, it will prove the in-
effectiveness of modern fortifications
against the even more modern guns,
for Antwerp is the last word in in-
genious barriers.

To the east, the situation on the
East Prussian frontier is becoming more
like what happened in France after the
German invasion and retreat.

May Be Decisive

Being driven from Poland, the Ger-
mans are making a stubborn stand, and
with reinforcements from Koenigsberg
will doubtless give a battle which will
determine whether the Germans will
again invade Russia in this region.

Roundabout dispatches reaching Lon-
don from Petrograd say that a new
Russian army has arrived at the fron-
tier near Posen, while another is march-
ing toward Tarnobrzeg. All reports of the
surrender of Przemyśl have been denied
by the Russian government, and various
reports about the beginning of a battle at Cracow.

HOIST WITH OWN PETARD

German Fishing Boat Blown Up By
Mine.

Copenhagen, via London, Oct. 9.—7
a.m.—A German fishing vessel has been
blown up by a German mine in the
Langeland belt, north of the coast of
Denmark. The captain was killed, but
the rest of the crew were saved.

SEIZE GERMAN SUPPLIES

VALUED AT \$2,000,000

Paris, Oct. 8.—6:51 p.m.—The French
authorities have seized food supplies
valued at between \$1,500,000 and \$2,000,
000, which had been deposited on the
docks at Havre by a German firm. The
action was taken in order to prevent the
supplies being sent abroad.

FALL RESULTED FATALLY

German in Canada

Like Conditions Here

Says Ex-Governor

LONDON Oct. 8.—10:45 p.m.—
Karl Grey, former Governor-
General of Canada, in an address
today before the proposed insti-
tute of industry and commerce
commented on the half million
Canadians of German descent.

"These Germans," said Earl
Grey, "love the conditions which
they find in Canada as much as
they hate the conditions, which
they leave behind and, if we can
obtain a large influx of such im-
migrants into our dominions,
we shall have a combination of
German culture under free in-
stitutions, not upon might, but upon right."

TO SAVE LINER

FROM WINTER ICE

German Boat Will Be Taken to New
York.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 8.—The Ger-
man liner Kronprinzessin Cecilie prob-
ably will be removed by the Govern-
ment from Bar Harbor, where she found
refuge from British cruisers at the out-
break of the European war, to avoid
injury from ice during the approach-
ing winter.

She will be taken to New York, as it
has been represented that the vessel
can make the cruise without getting
beyond the territorial waters of the
United States, thus escaping the pos-
sibility of seizure by British war ves-
sels.

If this can be done the Government
will probably advise the court officers
in charge of the vessels, which is un-
der the terms of the three mile limit.
The Government is not ready to commit it-
self, however, to a recognition of the
right of the British to seize the ship
under her peculiar status, even if she
is taken outside of the three mile limit.
Law officers of the various depart-
ments involved are still wrestling with
the legal question.

OFFER LAST DOLLAR

TO AID MOTHERLAND

Alberta Legislature United in Face of
Present Danger.

[Canadian Press.]

EDMONTON, Oct. 8.—In the Pro-
vincial Legislature this afternoon
they keynote was unanimity in the
face of the empire crisis and a desire
that Alberta should lead all Canada
in evidence of loyalty to Great
Britain. Leader of the Opposition
McIntyre, in speaking on the speech
from the throne, said:

"We will not oppose the Govern-
ment in the measures that may be
brought down, but will, if we have
opposition to offer, reserve such op-
position for a future session."

Premier Sifton, in closing the de-
bate, said Alberta would give the
last dollar she could spare, and he
last man, in the defence of the em-
pire. There would be no moratorium
measures introduced, he said, at the
present time. The Government
would present legislation, however,
providing that no seizures be made
during the war, except under the
authority of the sheriff's office, thus
placing such proceedings entirely in
the hands of the Government.

FORMER SENATOR INDICTED.

Chicago, Oct. 8.—Former United States
Senator William Lorimer was indicted
for the federal grand jury today on a
charge of misappropriation of the funds
of the La Salle Street National Bank,
of which he was president.
