WILLIAM REED DIES, AGED 90

Well-Known Horticulturist and Former Alderman Leaves Many Friends.

Death Ends 37 Years' Residence in London of Veteran Railwayman.

Death removed one of London's most-respected and widely-known citizens Friday, when William Reed, who has resided in this city during the past 37 years, succumbed at his 296 Horton street.

Mr. Reed, who was ninety years old, was born in Southampton, England. Since his twenty-second year he has made his home in Palmerston. Hamilton and London.

During the 37 years spent in London Mr. Reed cultivated a large circle of friends, who mourn his death. In 1900 his popularity was evinced at the municipal polls when Mr. Reed was elected to the city council, on which body he served for one year.

He was one of the few surviving employees of the Great Western Rail way, the first steam transportation system to enter London, which has been replaced by the Grand Trunk

Following his retirement from the railway, several years ago, Mr. Reed devoted his time to the hobby of gardening. His prowess in cultivating flowers won him an enviable rep utation among district amateur gar-deners, the grounds of his home being noted for their beautiful ap-

As a reward for his horticultural efforts, Mr. Reed was awarded the Adam Beck medal for the best home gardens in London one season

Possessing a warm personality this lover of flowers earned the respect of many Londoners, who admired the sterling qualities of character which he exemplified in his daily life.


