Mickey Walker's "Bring 'Em On" Attitude Is Increasing Popularity.

New York, Oct. 25.—Mike McGuire's efforts to hang onto the world's light-heavyweight championship, for which he is entirely too light, have cost him the right to box in New York state for a year. The state boxing commission ruled him out Friday for his failure to accept a challenge from Gene Tunney, the American champion of the class. McGuire, apparently realizing that he hadn't a chance of holding the title against so big and powerful a man as Tunney, has been sidestepping Gene for a long time. It won't be necessary to do any more sidestepping in these parts for the next two months, for Mike can't box any more.

Following Mickey Walker's battle against Jack Malone in Newark on Monday night, he will agree to tackle Dave Shadle for the welter title.

This is a sure attraction for the fall. Most people think it will be a Jersey, but the odds are that New York will be the scene of the encounter.

New York promoters are starving for some big money bouts, and so are the politicians, for one reason or another. It is up to the boxing commission to get to get busy for what use is a commission if there is nothing to commission.

This talk has been heard all the great while of Walker having nothing against the boxing commission, maintaining a smiling silence when Walker is mentioned. It is pretty sure evidence that underdog wires are being pulled.

Gaining Popularity. The first result of this pulling is Walker's announcement that he certainly will give Shadle a chance at the title, that Shadle deserves it, and that he will sign up as soon as the Malone battle is out of the way.

Walker has a great chance to steal a lot of Benny Leonard's. Walker is willing to fight anyone, and he has the additional incentive of needing the money. He told the writer the other day he would go after them all, from middleweights to the boys who scale just under 170 pounds.

By keeping his hand in this respect, Walker could make the country ring with his praise and be a reigning attraction everywhere.

WESTERN'S EDGES.

St. Mike's defeated Varsity twice, while Varsity defeated Western to open the campaign. Since that time though, Western has beaten Aggies twice by much greater scores than either St. Mike's or Varsity were able to pile up against the Farmers. And the big outstanding fact is that Western has beaten St. Mike's for the Irishmen's only loss of the season. They really beat them 7-0, as St. Mike's try which made the score look close, was rather freakish. It came, too, at a moment when Western had rather let down. There will be no let downs at any stage of the melee Wednesday.

Western's success so far this year is all the more inspiring because it came so unexpectedly. Western had made no attempt to attract players and two days after the drills had been ordered started, the Purple and White were still without Pickley, who if Western wins Wednesday, will be dubbed the Moose that took the local varsity out of the football bondage imposed for so many years by Varsity, St. Mike's and Guelph O.A.C.

With the weights he asked favor from no man he met in pro competition. He could box and wrestle, too. Knox was coach of the Canadian Olympic team in 1920, and did some excellent work coaching schoolboy athletes for the Ontario athletic commission.

Wednesday both the players and committee will meet in the evening after drill in room 6 at the Y. M. C. A. A chalk talk will be a feature of this meeting, which will be the first of several meetings to be held before the next game.
