THE LIBERALS HAVE GAINED

If they Hold their Own in Coming Contests.

GLADSTONE WILL HAVE A SMALL MAJORITY.

Midlothian not Unanimous for the Liberal Leader.

INDEPENDENT LABOR CANDIDATES.

Justin McCarthy Finds a New Constituency—Mr. Blake and His Hat—The Liberal Leaders in Conference.

London, July 12, midnight.

MR. GLADSTONE BEFORE HIS CONSTITUENTS. Mr. Gladstone addressed the final meeting of electors of Midlothian at Penicuik yesterday. He said the poll completely convinced him that the great majority of the British were in their hearts friends of the Irish cause. Next to home rule labor questions would be the main subject for the attention of statesmen. Replying to criticisms on his foreign policy Gladstone said it was quite true that the last Liberal Government had wars to deal with, but he contended that every one of those wars were undertaken to redress honorable engagements into which the Government's predecessors had entered, or to remove difficulties which they had raised. The seasonableness of continuing the Home Rule controversy, he declared, rested with the nation, for now the nation would be home rule, and to the nation would belong the honor of victory, or the shame and disgrace of failure.

ELECTION ROWS IN ENGLAND. Election riots occurred at Newburgh, Monmouthshire, yesterday. The police dispersed the rioters. Many horsemen were injured.

URGING THEM TO RENEWED EFFORTS. The Standard says:—The Unionists should redouble their efforts where contests are still to be decided. Sixteen days make all the difference whether Gladstone will undertake the risk of office or forthwith acknowledge home rule legislation impracticable.

CONSERVATIVES STILL 22 AHEAD. Up to this evening the Conservatives have elected 210 members of the new House of Commons, the Liberals 179, the anti-Parliamentarians 35, the Parliaments 5, and Unionists 31.

LABOR MEMBERS INDEPENDENT. As a forecast of the positions which the Burns section of the Labor party will hold, it may be mentioned that J. Kerhardie, the successful candidate in Westham, South, and John Burns' most energetic lieutenant, publicly denies that he owes any allegiance to Mr. Gladstone or to the Liberal party. On the contrary, he did his best at Bethnal Green to prevent the election in the north-east division of George Howell, who was elected as a Liberal, and is a Labor-Gladstonian opposed to the eight-hour movement. This is a very bad outlook for Mr. Gladstone in the Commons with the ridiculously slender and futile majority, with which he will go in.

LIBERALS GAIN THREE SEATS.

The Liberals have gained so far three seats to-day. Chesterfield, Woodstock and Doncaster—and have wiped out the Tory majority in Egremont. Chesterfield was formerly represented by Alfred Barnes, Liberal-Unionist; Woodstock by Lord Randolph Churchill, Conservative; Doncaster by Hon. W. A. W. Fitzwilliam, Liberal-Unionist, and Egremont by Lord Muncester, Conservative. The Liberals express confidence of returning to power. Fifteen elections take place in Scotland to-day, and the majority of them are expected to go for Gladstone. The election in which the greatest interest is felt is that in the Midlothian district of Edinburghshire, where Mr. Gladstone is opposed by Colonel Wanehope, Liberal-Unionist. Party feeling in the district is raised to fever heat, and polling was never before known to be so heavy. In 1885 Mr. Gladstone had a majority of 4,631 in this district, and in 1886 he was returned without opposition.

THE LIBERAL LEADERS. Mr. Morley joined Mr. Gladstone to-day, who remained quietly at Dalmeny Park during the day. Mr. and Mrs. Gladstone and son will start for Bournemouth to-night for a rest and change of air. Lord Rosebery will go a yachting.

JUSTIN MCCARTHY.

Justin McCarthy, who was beaten by a small majority at Londonderry the other day, will be the anti-Parliament candidate in North Londonderry. Tim Healy was to have been the candidate, but he was elected in Cork, and the seat will now be contested by Mr. McCarthy. Mr. Blake and Mr. Healy have both invaded the North riding to speak for McCarthy. Mr. Blake got tremendous reception when he appeared on the platform. He still wears his famous soft felt hat, and as a "tile" is the usual head-gear of the candidate there. Mr. Blake is wherever seen immediately singled out as the "man from America."

THE POLL IN MIDLOTHIAN. Late reports from Edinburgh say that in spite of bad weather the Midlothian poll was remarkably heavy. The Unionists had the advantage of the possession of most of the vehicles. Colonel Wanehope made a tour of all the booths to stimulate his supporters. The Liberal church party made a strong effort to give Mr. Gladstone a lesson on the Church Disestablishment question. They had no desire to unsettle him, but they claim to have reduced his

majority by 2,000 as a warning. It is known that at the Bankruptcy Court, Edinburgh, the poll went against Gladstone in the proportion of five to one.

Oxfordshire, Woodstock division—Benson (Liberal), 4,278; Marcell (Conservative), 4,167. In the by-election the Conservative candidate was unopposed.

Staffordshire, north-west division, Heath (Conservative).

Somerset, south division, Strassley (Liberal).

Herefordshire, Ross division, Biddulph, Liberal-Unionist, 4,326; Puley, Liberal, 3,869. In 1886 the Liberal-Unionist majority was 2,398.

Antrim, North division—Connor, Conservative, 4,066; Deeds, anti-Parliament, 2,027. In the by-election the Conservative majority was 1,382.

Monmouthshire, South division—Morgan, Conservative, 5,421; Profums, Liberal, 4,700. In 1886 the Conservative majority was 2,882.

Londonderry County, South division—Lea, Liberal-Unionist, 4,504; Walker, anti-Parliament, 4,053. In 1889 the Liberal-Unionist majority was 138.

The aggregates of the poll so far is, Liberalist, 1,518,131; Opposition, 1,598,237.

The Eruption of Mount Etna. A Calamia dispatch says:—The subterranean rumblings which began simultaneously with the outbreak of Mount Etna on Friday night, were less frequent yesterday than on the previous day. The eruption from the new fissure at the summit of Mt. Etna, which threatened some of the villages in the eastern and southern declivities, appear about to cease. The principal crater, however, shows signs of renewed activity, and a broad stream of lava is flowing in the direction of Nicotri.
