Influenza Claims Life of Young Lady

MISS ANNA HILLER HAD BEEN ILL ONLY SINCE SUNDAY AFTERNOON.

One of the homes in the city which has been ravaged by influenza is at 192 Waterloo Street where a popular young lady succumbed to the illness at 9.45 o'clock this morning. Only since last Sunday afternoon had the deceased lady been laid up with the affliction. Up and around, bright and jovial as always, the illness overcame her on the afternoon of the day mentioned. She found it necessary to retire. The illness became more acute and soon developed into complications which this morning caused her death.

The demise of Miss Hiller has occasioned general sorrow. The community is grieved that a bright life should be brought to an early close. Citizens mourn with the bereaved parents and family.

Surviving her are her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Carl Hiller and the following sisters and brothers: Emma at home, Mrs. Herbert Musselman, city; Marie at home; Fred at Bridgeport, Otto in the city; William and Edward at home. The deceased was born in this city and was twenty-one years of age.

She was a member of St. Peter's Lutheran Church, she was a faithful teacher in the Sunday School and a staunch member of the Young Peoples' Society.

The funeral will be held on Friday afternoon. After a service at the residence, 192 Waterloo Street, at 2 o'clock a service will be held at St. Peter's Church. Internment will follow in Mount Hope Cemetery.

Another Coombe Home Boy Killed

Private John B. Shanks Died of Wounds.

TWO IRISH LADS WIN MILITARY MEDALS.

Another of the gallant Irish lads, Pte. John B. Shanks, who came out to the Coombe Home has made the supreme sacrifice. The sad intelligence of his death from wounds was conveyed by cable to Inspector A. Pullan yesterday.

When seen by The Record today Mr. Pulla paid a high tribute to the late soldier, who was but nineteen years of age. A brother, Jim Shanks, who enlisted early in the war, was injured and has returned. This lad still has a quantity of shrapnel in his body.

Pte. John Shanks enlisted with the 70th Battalion, but in England was transferred to the 5th Canadian Mounted Rifles, and when that unit got over to France. Some time ago he was wounded by shrapnel in five places, but after re-operating in England he went back again to the firing line, only to meet with further injuries which proved fatal.

The record of the Irish lads from the Home is indeed splendid. One hundred and fifty answered the call, of these eighteen have laid their lives on the altar of liberty.

One of the dead heroes, Andrew Smith, won the military medal for conspicuous bravery, but died from wounds received while accomplishing his heroic act.

Another lad, Fred Johnston, at present is in hospital in England recovering from a revolver shot in the abdomen, which shows he was at close quarters with the enemy. Young Johnston recently was awarded the military medal, but in a letter to Inspector Pullan forgot to mention the fact.

The lad that wrote to the Inspector telling him of the honors won by Pte. Johnston, also told of the narrow escape two other Coombe Home boys had from death. The two were pals, and were serving in the same unit. One night they lay down together in a ditch to sleep, and as they slept a huge shell came over, and bursting near them, took the skin off the bridge of one lad's nose, and a chunk out of the thigh of the other.

La Grippe Has Attacked the City

Over 250 Cases Reported in the Municipality. TWO DEATHS ALREADY FROM THE DISEASE.

"There is no longer any doubt about the kind of Grippe that has infected the city—it's Spanish Grippe, and I would judge over two hundred and fifty citizens are down with it at present," said a prominent local physician to The Record to-day.

Continuing the physician said "The disease is highly contagious, and in homes where anyone is suffering from it every effort should be made to isolate the patient from other members of the household. Infection is chiefly caused from the discharge from the nose, coughing and sneezing, and every one affected should cough and sneeze into a handkerchief which should be burned and not left lying around until the sputum dries."

The physician also stated the complication which sometimes sets up is pneumonia, and when this occurs the patient is in for a bad time.

Allies Obtain Control of Bulgarian Railways

Are to Occupy All Important Strategic Points Bulgaria To Permit Passage of Troops Through Country; Back Door To Austria Opened.

London, Sept. 30.—Bulgaria has surrendered completely and unconditionally to the entente powers and has quit the war. An armistice was signed at noon to-day at Saloniki and hostilities were at once ordered stopped. This was officially announced this afternoon by the Government.

Gen. Franchot, d'Esperey, the allied commander-in-chief, signed for the entente, and the three Bulgarians delegates, Gen. Lonoff, Finance Minister Liapcheff and M. Radeg, for their Government.

By the terms Bulgaria immediately demobilizes her army, evacuates all the territory occupied by her armies, gives over control of her railways and means of transportation on the Danube to the entente, yields all her arms and ammunition to their care and agrees to free passage of entente troops through her country. No attempt was made to arrange boundaries, this is to be left to the general peace conference, until

Which time the present agreement remains in force. In the meantime Bulgaria remains a neutral.
The first news of the surrender of Bulgaria was received here this afternoon in an official dispatch from Paris. Soon after the arrival of the Paris dispatch, Hon. Bonar Law, chancellor of the exchequer, told a meeting at the Guildhall of the signing of the armistice.
Bulgaria, by the terms fixed, gives up completely the control of the railway, the chancellor stated, pointing out that this gives the entente control of Bulgaria.
"This convention means," said the chancellor, "that communication between Germany and the East in that direction has been cut off, and that the German dream of a German Middle Eastern empire has gone forever."
"There is no changing of metal here at the wonderful success of the past week," the chancellor remarked. "But joy bells are ringing in all our hearts."
