# PREACHING DRINGS CHARGES AGAINST TRADESMEN

### Says Young Girls in London Shown Are Paid Miserable Wage and Must Eke It Out by Immorality

London, April 14.—With the object of re-organizing the public utterances about the evils of shop life for women, the Rev. R. J. Campbell attended a council meeting of the Drapers' Chamber of Trade at the offices of the London Chamber of Commerce. Arthur Pyne, who presided, said that the employers represented by the Chamber employed 75,000 assistants, and fully expressed his concern at large. The members included most of the houses in the West End and the suburbs. Campbell had said that in some West End shops the young women were paid such miserable wages that they were expected, and indeed encouraged, to eke it out by immorality. They recognized in Mr. Campbell a man of the Gospel and a man of great sincerity and appreciated his courage in coming alone to meet about sixty members of the trade. The statement had caused great uneasiness throughout the trade, and they had a feeling of injustice that a broad statement should be made covering every employer, when, though immorality might exist, it did not to any extent.
