TRAIN WRECK  
ON C. N. RAILWAY

Two Killed Others Injured—Train Plunged Into Nashwaak River Monday.

Two trainmen were killed, another badly scalded and three others painfully but not seriously bruised and shaken up when Train No. 644, a way freight from Fredericton to Newcastle on the Canada Eastern Railway was yesterday suddenly plunged over an embankment into the Nashwaak river from the approach to the bridge about two miles north of the Marysville station.

The Dead are:  
John Gillis, engineer, aged 40 years, of Newcastle.  
John Estabrooks, brakeman, aged 37 years, of Fredericton.

The Injured are:  
Clifford Hughes, fireman, of Fredericton, badly scalded about the arms and legs.

Walter Long, conductor, of South Devon, bruised and scratched.  
Nicholas Osborne, brakeman, of Devon, bruised and scratched.

Following a heavy rain on Sunday, a dam on the Nashwaak River, owned by the Nashwaak Pulp and Paper Company, gave away and the rush of logs thus released tore away the embankment, so that when the train came along the locomotive, tender and one freight car rolled down the embankment of almost twenty feet into the river.
