FINAL ROUND, SATURDAY

Campbellton, having reached the final by drawing a bye, were ready to meet Bathurst. A game between these old antagonists is always popular, and was watched by an interested crowd. The afternoon rinks were Stout vs. Wran and Mullin vs. Wilson. Stout started in well with a 2 end and Wran evened up in the second. Stout got one in the third, but for the following 5 ends his peg remained in the third hole, while Wran increased his lead to 13. Stout got a 2 in the 12th, and on the last three ends Wran advanced by 18, finishing ahead with a comfortable lead of 11 points.

On the other side Mullin and Wilson were having a battle royal. At the 8th end, honors were even at 8. At the 11th the figures were again a tie at 10s. In the 11th Mullin with his last stone, just missed by a hair's breadth a chance for a 6 end. Bathurst lay the shot with Campbellton's only counter lying No. 2. When the smoke cleared away, the stone still lay undisturbed and Lannigan's face was a study in bitter disappointment.

Wonderful things continued to happen in the 13th Wilson's last stone decided, on its way down, to attain its object by another route from that originally intended, but Mullin picked it out with a beauty and counted the point. In the 14th Wilson lying 3, and with an open door for number 2, raised in a Bathurst stone for number 2, and only counted a single point. "Happy's" last stone was the only one in the rink, changing the score with one that had just been laid on the outside circle by McKay. This contest finished up 10-16 in favor of the locals.
