The price of newsprint in Canada has doubled in the last few years, but the paper makers still contend that they need money. Their annual reports show the contrary, but the ultimate consumer is the public. There is no remedy in sight, and Canadian publishers are being steadily compelled to increase subscription and advertising prices. Not only for paper, but for fuel, labor, freight, in fact in all directions, the Canadian publishers have been hard hit since the beginning of the war.

## BIG TIMBER SALE

Beeler & Peters Now Have a Mill on the Morse Road

Messrs. Beeler and Peters, of Bridgetown, have purchased from Mr. Avarad Gillis and others several hundred acres of timber land near the Morse Road, seven miles from Bridgetown, and at a cost of \$8,000 will erect a saw mill capable of completing 1250 barrels per day. Two crews are in the woods and the new plant is expected to be in operation in June. This will not interfere with the operation of the firm's plant in town for it is expected that their rapidly increasing business will warrant the running of both mills.

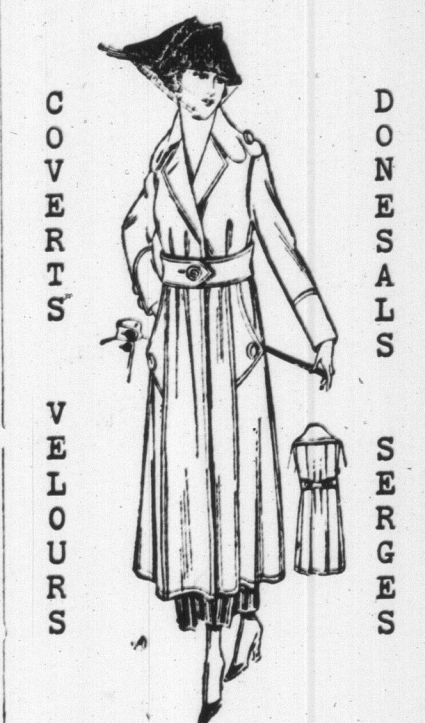

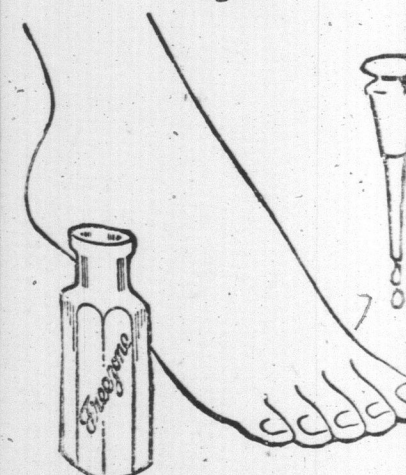
