

Biography of Henry G. Viaurac

With the close of the year 1868, another volume of 600 pages of the Canadian Naturalist and Geologist was completed. In this - and more than in the preceding volumes there is no special reference to any thing connected with the personality of young Vernon. We know however that he was still pursuing his studies at the Collage that he read with care full attention the various articles of this magazine, and that as his rambling gambols through the city, on the banks of the St. Lawrence, and in the fields, over the mountain or among the rocks and glens, his eyes and ears were ever open to see and hear even from off bird life that presented itself, as all the notes were wafted on the air, either in the summer sunshine, or when the chill blasts of winter were howling around. Here we may pause and let the learned glances at the different writers on the subject of the Avifauna of Canada, whose names - up to this period - we have been able to collect from the historical historical publications of this country. The first information that we have that any person in Canada wrote on the subject of its avifauna is furnished by Mr. George of Quebec city, who stated that a description of Canada birds was written in 1663, by Pierre Boucher, the Governor of Three Rivers.
