Death of a Distinguished Convert.

The London Catholic Times says: The death of Dr. Frederick George Lee has followed fast on the announcement of his reception into the Catholic Church. No doubt, when making the change, he felt that he was nearing the end. It was only then that full conviction as to the truths of the Catholic Faith came to him, but for many years the Catholic Church was attracting him, and he did much by his actions and his writings to enable Catholics to comprehend in some degree the force and beauty of her dogmas. So far back as 1856 he helped to establish the Association for the Promotion of the Unity of Christendom, of which Mr. Athelstan Riley is now president, and in later years he took a prominent part in founding the Order of Corporate Reunion and in promoting its work. The object in view failed, as it was bound to do, but the labors of Dr. Lee and those who co-operated with him were not in vain. They succeeded in removing many prejudices which told against good will in religious polemics, and generally they introduced a great deal of sweetness and light into the atmosphere of controversy. His life certainly affords an example to people who devote their minds to frivolous subjects. From his earliest years the service of God was the central motive which governed his conduct, and for him there could be no happiness on earth without earnest devotion to spiritual interests.
