What I call native intuitions, or primitive perceptions, is in Scripture sometimes designated by the word Nature. Speaking of the sense of shame, the Apostle argues, "Doth not even nature itself teach you, that, if a man have long hair, it is a shame unto him? But if a woman have long hair, it is a glory to her: for her hair is given her for a covering." Again : " For when the Gentiles do by nature the things contained in the law, these, having not the law, are a law unto themselves; which shew the work of the law written in their hearts, their conscience also bearing witness, and their thoughts, the mean while, accusing or else excusing one another."

Let me now hope that while I am endea-

vouring to point at primitive perceptions as faculties which God has bestowed upon my readers, they will desire that these faculties may be sanctified into feelings of devotion and the living energies of an active piety. Solomon was astonished at the condescension of the Deity in coming to the temple built with man's hands by the divine command. Is it not a cause for greater astonishment, that God will condescend to make us, sinners and depraved though we are, temples of the Holy Ghost! May none of us give himself any rest, until he knows by experience that the Lord in very deed doth put his law into our inward parts, and write it in our hearts; that he is our God, and that we are his people!

OBADIAH QUEST. [We must confess to our friend Obadiah, that we think he makes much more of primitive perceptions than we should be disposed to do. As his signature is a fictitious one, we have taken some liberties of omission and modification which we thought needful. It is precious little of Divine that we find in the natural man, to any practical purpose .-Editor.]

ECCLESIASTICAL.

CHURCHES AT KINGSTON -It is gratifying to learn that two additional Churches are likely to be soon commenced at Kingston. The one to be erected in the old burial-ground, is to be a memorial to the late Rev. R. D. Cartwright, towards which the sum of £800 had been contributed several weeks ago. The other is to accommodate a very increasing portion of the city, called Lot 21; £300 had been raised towards its cost. The Hon. Mr. Macaulay has given a valuable piece of ground as a site.

THE BISHOP OF MASSACHUSETTS' ADDRESS to the Convention, from which we gave an important extract in our 15th number, has been re-printed in England, and 6500 conies of it had been sold a month ago.

The Special Convention of the Diocese of Pennsylvania, (see Berean of 20th June) met on the 5th instant. The meeting was attended by 64 Clerical, and 76 Lay Delegates; and, after the election of a presiding officer (the Rev. Dr. Bull) in the absence of the Bishop, with other preliminary business, it was moved by Mr. Lewis R. Ashhurst "that the resignation of the Right Rev. Henry U. Onderdonk be accepted."

It appears that certain grave and painful reasons had arisen rendering the Bishop's retirement from his office the measure most conducive to the peace of the Church within, and to her credit without. A proposal to postpone the consideration of Mr. Ashhurst's motion was negatived by a vote of 111 against 27, and the Convention was in the act of taking the vote on the question of accepting the resignation, when the Secretary announced and read another communication from the Bishop, intimating that, as he believed the Convention was about to act upon his resignation for other reasons than the one he had assigned, viz. ill-health, he withinken the said tender of resignation. A question now arising, whether any resignation was before the Body, it was ruled by the Chairman, that the document was the property of the Convention, and could not he withdrawn without its consent. After discussion, the question was taken on the proposition to accept the resignation. It was taken by Aves and Noes, that is to say, each clerical member had one vote, and so had each parish represented by Jaity; but the perishes represented by more than one lay-representative had each but one vote, so that six parishes lost their votes altogether, because their representatives were not unanimous. The result was as follows :---

Ayes-51 Clergy, 55 Churches,

Noes-13 do 15 do. The Chairman therefore declared that the resignation was accepted, two thirds of both orders having voted in the affirmative. The concurrence of the General Convention of the Episcopal Church in the United States, which is to meet on the first Wednesday of next month, is necessary to render the decision of the Dincesan Convention linal .- Condensed from the Episcopal Recorder.

_____ LATER FROM EUROPE. -- In the absence of intelligence by the Unicorn, which has not yet arrived, the Packet Ship Oxford has furnished us, via New York, with Liverpool dates to the 23rd August. The Queen and her infant were doing well. Some of the English papers were urging the Government to adopt a firmer tone towards France, in respect to recent transactions. There had been a considerable fall in the English Funds on the 20th August, which was supposed to have been occasioned by unfavourable news from France, brought express by carrier pigeons. The destruction caused by the bombardment of Tangiers appears to have been much exaggerated by the French accounts. Only one gun was dismounted on shore and but six or eight lives lost; and the affair is not considered as having advanced the reputation of French Gunnery or Seamanship.

Tho' the imports of Canadian Flour in Liverpool were extensive, the demand had increased and an advance of 6d per brl. had been obtained; wheat was also in request at an advance of 1d to 2d per 70 lbs. The trade in the manufacturing districts continued brisk.

ALARM OF FIRE .- The premises of Mr. Musson, druggist, at the head of Mountain St. narrowly escaped destruction by fire on Mon-day night. Mr. Russell, the chief of police, while passing rather late, perceived a glare of light in the shop, and upon examination discovered that a part of the interior was in flames. He immediately aroused the inmates, and having effected an entrance into the shop, easily extinguished the fire, which, if loft undisturbed for a few moments longer, might have caused the destruction of the building and all its contents. Great credit is due to Mr. Russell for his vigilance and presence of mind. But little damage was done.
