AUTOMOBILES—RENEWAL OF CANADA-U.S.

AGREEMENT

Mr. A. D. Hales (Wellington): Mr. Speaker, I should like to direct my question to the Minister of Industry, Trade and Commerce. It is in connection with the United States-Canada car pact. Could the minister advise the house whether the letters of intent, or agreement, signed by the Canadian car manufacturers have been withdrawn or cancelled?
