Part having its proper Governor, who was also Proprietor of his own Division. The first of these Districts comprehended all the Land on the South Side of the River of St. Lawrence, from New England to Port Royal. That Part of the Peninfula which lies between Port Royal and Cape Can/ô, was contained in the second, the Governor of which resided at La Heve; and the third extended from Canfo to Cape Ga/pé, at the Mouth of the above-mentioned River.

These Governors likewise provided each for fecuring his own Demefne, by building Forts in proper Places. In the first Division one was built at Pentagoet, another at St. John's River, and a third at Port Royal: The fecond had Fort La Tour, already built, to which was added another at La Heve: The third fatisfied himfelf with a good Entrenchment at ChedabouEtou, thinking it unneceffary to be at any Expence on the reft of the Eastern Coast, which bounding to the Gulf of St. Lawrence, he judg'd was fufficiently fecured by the Ifle of Cape Breton, and the French Settlements at the Mouth of the Canada River, especially as it was not likely the English would make any Attempts on that Side.

In adjusting these Boundaries of the whole Province, it is very observable, that as this was
