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BALFOUR AND BORDEN TO SPEAK AT RALLY

Immense Patriotic Meeting Will
Mark Anniversary of War's
Beginning.

LONDON, July 30.—(Right Hon. A. J. Balfour and Premier Borden will be the principal speakers at a monster patriotic meeting on Wednesday on the anniversary of the opening of the war. The Daily Telegraph, in a special article, says: "What he has said in the name of Canada is true of all the empire, and the honors paid him by the City of London, the invitation to him to take part in the innermost councils of the government, are a recognition made thru him of what this country owes to every man in the dominions who

has declared for imperial unity, for the blood brotherhood and companionship in arms in this war."
"That decision will have effects reaching far beyond the military issues of today; it will bear noble fruit as surely as Canada's emblem will flourish over those graves in France where Sir Robert Borden has planted the seeds of maple."

Howden Not Believed.
The evidence given as to the meeting between J. H. Howden, then attorney-general, and the opposition leader, is reviewed in full. Howden swore that at this meeting Norris told him any arrangements made by William Chambers would be all right. Norris swore that Chambers' name was not even mentioned.
"Without regard," say the commissioners, "to improbabilities in the narrative of Howden, which themselves cast grave doubt upon it, we base our acceptance of Norris' statement upon the respective characters of the two men as revealed by the evidence. The members of this commission unhesitatingly accept Norris' account of what took place at the interview in question."

CHARGES AGAINST NORRIS DISMISSED

"Impossible to Say" Negotiations Were Improper, Investigators Report.

HOWDEN DISBELIEVED

Norris' Version of Interview is Accepted Without Hesitation.

WINNIPEG, Man., July 30.—That the charges made by C. P. Fullerton, K.C., on behalf of fourteen private members of the legislature, were unfounded, is the finding made by the royal commission, of which Mr. Justice Perdue is the chairman, made public today. The commissioners report that "it is impossible to say" that the negotiations which attended the resignation of the Roblin Government were "in any degree improper or unfair."

The commissioners, Mr. Justice Perdue, Mr. Justice Galt and Public Utilities Commissioner Robson, were unanimous in their finding. The report contains about eight thousand words and sets out in the beginning the statement made by Fullerton before the Mathers Royal Commission when he asked for the investigation. Fullerton made two separate charges.

(1) That an agreement had been made between the late government and the then opposition whereby, in consideration of the payment to the then opposition of \$50,000 all election protests were to be dropped; and (2) That early in May this year an agreement was made between the members of the government and members of the present government and certain other parties that the Roblin Government should resign, the allegation being that the royal commission was to be stifled and that no action should be taken against Kelly; that the Liberal should dictate Sir Rodmond Roblin's letter of resignation and that the balance of \$25,000 under the alleged previous agreement should be paid.

Charges Not Proven.
In addition he charged that the members of the late government were to resign and their places be taken by the Liberals unopposed.

The commissioners find: "That the first charge set forth in the statement contained in the order-in-council is unfounded and that no agreement involving payment of money or any other consideration was made between the late government and any member thereof and the then opposition or any member thereof."

"That the second charge is unfounded and that no agreement was made involving any improper consideration or motive whereby the Conservative Government should resign, the present Government should obtain office."

When follow their reasons for the findings, a summary of the important portions of the evidence and the commissioners' conclusions.

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INSURANCE COMPANIES LOSE THRU ACCIDENTS

Several local insurance companies have been hard hit by the Lusitania and Queenston disasters. The Travelers' Indemnity Company is about the greatest loser. Its final total Lusitania loss on accident policies will be about \$110,000. The total cost of these policies or the amounts paid in as premiums is \$256. The Canada Life Assurance Company was a loser to the extent of \$20,000, representing policies held by five victims. The Sun Life had only one claim presented, which is now under discussion. The Confederation Life lost about \$7000 on two or three policies.

This the Queenston tragedy. The Travelers' Indemnity Company lost about \$12,000, comprising two policies for \$7500 and \$4500, held by Sydney W. Grant and Harold J. Fardoe, respectively, and for which the company had received \$1750 in premiums.

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CRISIS APPROACHING IN GREEK SITUATION

Bitter Attack of Venizelos on
Goumbus Government is
Significant.

AGAINST PEOPLE'S WILL

Pro-German Work Perpetual-
ly to Prevent Return of
Ex-Premier to Power.

MILAN, July 30.—A violent attack on the government by ex-Premier Venizelos is considered in Italy to mark a new phase of the Greek situation. The Goumbus Cabinet he declared has done everything to prevent the nation giving expression to its will, has stopped the constitutional life as a country and has used the name of the King, but the nation had nevertheless broken thru all the obstacles by which it had been neutralized.

The danger in the situation lies in the fact that the government without authority had plunged into discord, continued Venizelos. "This caused me to decide to return to public life. In vain the present government claiming to have the confidence of the King, but not that of the people, has tried to falsify the elections. I hope that the King's restoration to health will soon put an end to all rumors which accuse the government of plotting a coup d'etat, that of the dissolution of parliament before it even meets."

There is not the slightest doubt that the internal situation in Greece is rapidly approaching a crisis of the most dangerous kind.
