### **CHARGES AGAINST** NORRIS DISMISSED

Impossible to Say" Negotiations Were Improper, Investigators Report.

### HOWDEN DISBELIEVED

Norris' Version of Interview is Accepted Without Hesitation.

WINNIPEG, Man., July 30.—That the charges made by C. P. Fullerton, K.C., on behalf of fourteen private members of the legislature, were unfounded, is the finding made by the royal commission, of which Mr. Justice Perdue is the chairman, made public today. The commissioners report that "it is impossible to say" that the pagetian

The commissioners report that "it is impossible to say" that the negotiations which attended the resignation of the Roblin Government were "in any degree-improper or unfair."

The commissioners, Mr. Justice Perdue, Mr. Justice Galt and Public Utilities Commissioner Robson, were unanimous in their finding. 
