STUDENTS OF EIGHTEEN ADMITTED TO FACULTY

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MANY OFFICERS AS CASUALTIES

Major Beresford Topp Has Been Wounded for Third Time.

Word came yesterday that Lieut. Fred Werlen who went overseas as a captain in the 124th Battalion had died from wounds.

Lieut. Basil Roy Lepper, reported killed in action, was with the 44th Battalion in 1915.

Lieut. William Henry, killed in action, read his last letter to his wife, who resided at 345 Markham street, on the day of the letter's receipt.

Lieut. Clarence K. Flint, Edmonton, formerly of Toronto, is reported killed in action.

Lieut. E. B. Preston, killed in action, was formerly a student of the University of Toronto.

Lieut. William T. Hall, reported killed in action, resided with his parents at 2145 East Gerrard street.

Lieut. John Goodwin Hill, who enlisted in 1915, and went overseas with an ammunition column, is reported to have died of wounds on Sept. 19.

Lieut. Robert R. Kerr, Military Medal, is reported to have been wounded in the leg in France.

Lieut. Edward B. Corran is reported wounded a second time. He went overseas with the 20th Battalion.

Capt. Chas. G. VanStone, 446 Indian regiment, is reported to have been wounded for the fourth time this year.

Lieut. L. E. Blackwell, 84 Pearson avenue, has been wounded in the leg in France.

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STEEL INTERSECTION FOR HEAD OF BLOOR

Toronto Railway Will Lay It at Once—Want Trestle Plans Changed.

The steel intersection for the Bloor and Sherbourne end of the viaduct has arrived in the city at last.

MUTUAL BENEFIT TO ALL PARTIES

Ideal of Organized Labor, Says T. A. Stevenson to Veterans.

"Labor is not organized to destroy, but stands for the mutual benefit of both employer and employe," stated T. A. Stevenson, secretary of the Trades and Labor Council, at the meeting of the Parkdale branch of the G.W.V.U. last night.

Mr. Stevenson discussed at some length the connection between the labor party and the Bolsheviks. He stated that the labor party should be dubbed 'Bolshevik' party.

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CAN NOT TAKE MONEY FOR USING INFLUENCE

An abrupt dismissal without damages to either side featured the case of Charles Garfunkel vs. Frank and Herman Hutner, which was heard before Chief Justice Falconbridge in the non-jury assize court yesterday.

The action was dismissed on the following grounds: "It is contrary to public policy that a person should be hired for money for valuable consideration to use his position and influence to procure a benefit from the government."

Inspector Ezekiel McFarlane tendered his resignation from the police force to the police commissioner at their meeting yesterday.

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FARMER WAS FINED; NOW ENTERS APPEAL

J. F. Cross Seeks Order Quashing Conviction and Fine of Five Hundred Dollars.

A motion was made before Mr. Justice Maclennan to quash the conviction of J. F. Cross, a farmer of Brantford, on a charge of having unlawfully exercised the right of way over the lands of the province of Ontario.

It is contended the conviction is bad, and that there was no evidence to show that there was no breach of the order-in-council, dated April 17, 1914.

It is alleged by affidavit that the magistrate at the trial manifested prejudice and bias towards the farmer as a class. The case will come up before the chief justice of the common pleas next week.
