Suffrage Progressing.

The Review of Reviews prints an excellent article this month on the subject of woman's enfranchisement. Suffragists should find it to the magazine. Statistics are there in full regarding our advancement during the last few years.

Several leading papers are, as usual, commenting on the same subject from different points of view. From an American journal comes the following Chicago despatch: "Taxation without representation is tyranny, the battle cry of women suffragists in England, and it is a familiar slogan in America," said Mrs. T. J. Cobden Sanderson of London, "but we are in the same condition as were the colonists before their fight for independence, and we will win, even as our forefathers did."

Mrs. Sanderson, who recently took part with other suffragettes in an attack upon the house of commons, for which she suffered imprisonment, is touring America with Mr. Sanderson and their daughter. They are the guests of Mrs. George M. Millard in Highland Park.

"I am amazed at the activity of the Chicago women," declared Mrs. Sanderson, after a reception in the Woman's Club. "Of course, in a political way, the American women do not take the part of the women in England do, but as active workers for woman suffrage they have made great strides. I expect great things from them in the near future."

"We are much further advanced in the suffrage movement in England than are the American women, for we already have municipal suffrage in London, and a woman eligible to election to the governing body, as parliament has just removed the disability, and we will soon see women forming part of that body. It will not be long now before we will win out on our parliamentary franchise and women will be seated there as well."

"We are fighting to make the government party make our issue a party measure, and then we will surely win, for we have most of the Liberals with us."

The point of view taken by politicians in Colorado, where woman suffrage already exists, is that it makes little practical difference, except in educational administration. It quotes statistics and adds: "It will be at once apparent from these figures that the field conceded to woman as best adapted to her qualifications is the educational one. Men

are more unscrupulous and desirous of power. Mere partisan politics do not interest women. But along those lines which are an extension of the influence previously exerted by her the franchise has offered to women a wider field, and a great many of them have entered it unashamedly. The things of the home as there are affected by official action and legislation—those things that make for purity, decency and humanity—these women have discovered and they are working for them with education, morality, civic habits, charities and corrections, and above everything relating to children, have appealed to women very strongly.

VLADIVOSTOCK SCENE OF EXCITING NAVAL BATTLE

Torpedo Boat Destroyer Gave Fight to Gunboat Mandschur and Other Vessels.

VLADIVOSTOK, Oct. 30.—An exciting little naval battle took place in this harbor to-day between the multitudinous crew of a Russian torpedo boat destroyer and their loyal comrades. The mutineers finally were subdued, but not before a number of men had been killed or wounded. The mutineers had done considerable damage to the gunboat Mandschur, the destroyer's Garosov, Smely and Serditza and the garrison of one of the harbor forts, manned by the 12th Regiment of Artillery. The Skory soon was overwhelmed and she had to be beached to save her from sinking. This was not accomplished, however, before her guns had done considerable damage, and several officers and men of the other ships had been killed or wounded.

The crew of the Skory were invited by agitators, including some Jews, who had managed to get on board and take charge of the destroyer. She steamed out into the harbor with the red flag flying and at once opened fire on the town and forts. A gunboat and three destroyers went out to engage her, and with the aid of the forts soon had her riddled and helpless. She then turned and ran thru the surf and was beached.

Those of the crew who had not been killed or wounded by the gunfire were arrested by soldiers as they made their way to land. Among the killed are Capt. Kurosch, commander of the torpedo boat Ravy, and Lieut. Spier, commander of the Skory; Lieut. Vastlie, commander of the Serditza, was wounded. Several people in Vladivostok were killed by shells from the Skory, among them one American. The town has been declared in a state of siege.

ONLY ENGINEER WAS KILLED. MONTREAL, Oct. 30.—The official report of accident near London, Ont., given out by the G. T. R. this morning follows: "Engine 446 on train No. 26, between Windsor and London, exploded yesterday at 10.25, two and three-quarter miles east of Newbury, Ont., killing Robert Rutherford and seriously injuring Fireman Robertson. No passengers were injured. Cause of accident as yet unknown."
