WHY NOT COMPETITION? It appears to have been the policy of the City Council in past years to insist on competition in the distribution of electric current throughout the city. Competition was provided for when the Incandescent Light Company in 1880, Paragraph 7 of that agreement reads as follows:

The company shall not, without the consent of the corporation, lease to, amalgamate with or sell to any other company, corporation, firm or individual, and in case the company shall lease to, amalgamate with or sell to any other company, corporation, firm or individual, all rights granted by this agreement shall cease and be forfeited.

A year or two ago the Incandescent Light Company wantonly trespassed on the rights of the citizens of Toronto by amalgamating with the Toronto Electric Light Company. We made every effort to prevent this, but the City Council made its agreement with the Incandescent Light Company in 1880, Paragraph 7 of that agreement reads as follows:

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For the time being the agitation to instal a civic plant to compete with the company has subsided, but last week a new danger threatened the company. The Toronto Railway Company had a bill before the Legislature asking for various privileges, among which it was supposed that the right to sell electric current in Toronto was in some mysterious way included. In order to head off this threatened invasion into its monopoly, the Electric Light Company engaged lawyers to the Private Bills Committee to make it dead sure that the citizens of Toronto should not get competition in electric light and power. The lawyers were J. K. Kerr, E. F. B. Johnston and Henry O'Brien. The fact that three high-priced Q.C.'s were retained is evidence of the company's intention to fight hard.

The first bill to be introduced into the House of Commons was that of the Toronto Railway Company, which would give the company the right to sell electric current in Toronto. The bill was introduced on January 10, 1893. The company's lawyers were J. K. Kerr, E. F. B. Johnston and Henry O'Brien. The fact that three high-priced Q.C.'s were retained is evidence of the company's intention to fight hard.

HASTY LEGISLATION. Why all this haste in provincial legislation? If Mr. Hardy must really "go to the country," why, go to the country and quit the rushing business. Let a lot of the bills stand over until after the elections.

Legislation in a one-chamber Legislature ought to be carefully considered and due time taken. If there was a second chamber, questionable legislation that is now going through for Victoria College would not be passed. The popular chamber, both sides, seem to be tumbling over one another to pass a bill not in the public interest. A second chamber might be beyond the influences that seem to control the Legislature just before an appeal to the people. Tricky amendments are constantly slipping through the legislative mill. A second chamber would catch some of these—like Mayor Fleming's little amendment of last year which made possible his swap of the Mayoralty for the Assessment Commissioner'ship.

There are some very doubtful measures now before the House, and the public would be better served by sending them over for another session. It was only discovered on Friday that the Lord's Day bill as now drafted will in effect stop Sunday cars all over Ontario, though it is believed that the Attorney-General had not that intention.

Take time, gentlemen; but if you must go to the country drop all these doubtful bills and give the people time to look into them.
