DEBIT TOTALS \$225,267

Supreme Lodge of Knights of Pythias Examine Former Head of Endowment Bank.

ADMITS PRACTICAL INSOLVENCY.

Toronto Knight, Representing 150,000 Members in Ontario, Says Two Members Will Be Straighted.

Chicago, July 10.—According to the report presented to the Supreme Lodge of Knights of Pythias, the endowment bank of the order has a deficit of \$225,267. Before the rank can legally continue doing business as an insurance institution, this deficit must be made good, and the question of how this is to be done, and the greater or how the funds of the organization are to be safeguarded in the future, occupied the attention of the Supreme Lodge officers and representatives all day yesterday, and far into the night. That there has been misappropriation of the funds of the organization by past officers of the endowment was freely charged in the reports as well as in the little doubt that after the Supreme Lodge had finished dealing with those who are thought to be responsible, the evidence with a request that it be submitted to the grand jury.

Wanted to Expel Him.

At the session last night, a motion was made to expel John A. SIXTEEN PERSONS NOW DEAD

Head-On Collision Between a Passenger and a Fast Freight Causes an Awful Wreck.

CONDUCTOR OVERLOOKED ONE FACT

Engineers on Both Engines Among the Main—No Epworth Leaguer on Board.

Kansas City, Mo., July 10.—Sixteen persons are dead, two probably fatally injured, and a large number of others less seriously hurt as the result of a head-on collision between passenger and fast freight trains on the Chicago & Alton Railroad near Kansas City, Mo., at 7 o'clock this morning. Six were killed outright, four died on a train conveying them to Kansas City and three died at a hospital in this city.

Killed Outright.

The dead are: Daniel J. Hanna, slater, Mo., conductor of the freight train; P. J. Anderson, slater, Mo., engineer of freight train; Frank Bridges, engineer of passenger train; C. S. Rogers, Chicago, U.S. Express Company messenger; Mrs. Gilliland and daughter of Goodland, Ind. These six were killed outright.

Died Afterwards.

D. W. Bookers of Syracuse, N.Y., died on train; Mrs. G. W. Snyder, Jasper, N.Y., died on train; G. L. Roy, cashier of Wilmington, Ill., Bank, died on train; Sydney Jones, Kansas City, died in hospital.

Daniel Donnelly of Mexico, Mo., fireman of the freight train, died today at University Hospital, making the death total 16. Three or four more deaths are expected.

Mrs. R. J. Curtis, Geneseo, N.Y., died at University Hospital, 67 years old, died at University Hospital.

DOUBLE DROWING AT THE ISLAND

LONG POND TAKES TWO MORE LIVES

Walter Smith, Aged 8, Paddled Beyond His Depth and Ernest McRae, Aged 15, Also Lost His Life in an Heroic Attempt to Rescue the Little Fellow—An Unprotected Death Trip.

The treacherous Long Pond at Centre Island claimed two more victims yesterday afternoon. Walter Smith, aged 8 years, of 110 Dundas-west, went in a rowing boat, and got beyond his depth. Ernest B. McRae, of Tiverton, Bruce County, who made an heroic attempt to save him, also met a watery grave.

Both lads visited Island Park with the annual excursion of West Presbyterian Sunday school, which was a member of the Sunday school, but went with the excursion with young friends who were schoolers.

After partaking of luncheon about 2:15 p.m., Smith, accompanied by several of his little friends, went over to the pond just west of John R. Wilson's refreshment pavilion.

Went to His Death.

The boy donned a bathing suit and went into the water. He had been paddling around for a few minutes, when he was noticed by those on shore, that he had gone down. Smith's body appeared above the water, and was sitting on the bank of the stream, without a moment's hesitation, waded in after Smith, without regard to his own safety, and in so doing, moving the bicycle into which he was clad.

Charles Davis, an eye-witness of the drowning, waded in after the boys, and was followed by John Matthews, who, however, could do nothing without endangering their own lives, and they returned to the shore.

No Life Saving Appliances.

Others had hurried in the meantime to Wilson's Pavilion to take a place in the boat, and the proprietor despatched them to Ferry Co's dock, where one was secured. Mr. Wilson was among the scene, followed by William Mills, Special Constable John Gray, Caretaker David Kimbrell of Centre Island, Caretaker Humphrey of Centre Island, and Harry E. WAR ON FEATHERS.

Bill in British Parliament May Spring Millinery Curfew.

London, July 10.—Fashionable milliners throughout England are alarmed over the proposed introduction in Parliament of a bill to forbid the use for decorative purposes of the feathers of the ostrich, the bird of paradise, the hummingbird, the kingfisher, the kingbird and the imperial pheasant.

Should the bill become law it will give power to the police to stop women on the streets wearing the forbidden feathers, and take their addresses, with a view to issuing summonses against them. On conviction of a first offence a second fine will be levied, and on a second offence the offender will be sent to prison without the option of a fine.

By the terms of the bill all hats and bonnets in which the prohibited feathers are found will be confiscated.

The bill promises the most influential backing both in the House of Commons and the House of Lords. It is the result of a long agitation, which has been going on since the introduction of the ostrich plume into the fashion of the whims of fashion.

THREE PLOTS OF BOER PRISONERS

TO CAPTURE BRITISH TRANSPORT

Refugee From Bermuda, Now Held in New York, Tells a Thrilling Story of His Desperate Attempt to Regain Liberty—Legal Aspects of Case.

New York, July 10.—The plucky young Boer, Du Ploy, who escaped from Darrell's Island, Bermuda, now detained at Ellis Island, awaiting the result of the proceedings that have been instituted to take him back, tells a thrilling story of his escape and of the events of the long voyage from Cape Town, when three plots were originated to seize the steamer and land on a foreign shore. Without food he remained in his grimy hiding place from Friday last until Monday evening, when, becoming exhausted, he gave himself up to whatever hospitality he might receive from the steamer's crew. They offered him food, but he could not eat, and has scarcely regained his former condition.

CRITICS OF STRATHCONA

Rampant in London's Canadian Colony

Aiming to Dislodge High Commissioner.

A DESPATCH EVIDENTLY INSPIRED.

Allegations That Business is Neglected for Society Declared to Be Baseless.

Chicago, July 10.—The Record-Herald's correspondent in London says: Bitter criticism of the Dominion's High Commissioner, Lord Strathcona, was published in the London Standard, which is a leading paper in London. The article, which is a half-hearted attempt to support the Dominion's commercial ambitions, and a demand for support to a younger and more aggressive Commissioner. Lacking such an agent, it is asserted that Canada will not continue to take a back seat as the United States is concerned in the establishment of the Dominion's premier colony.

The London representatives of leading Canadian manufacturers and shipping companies are said to be filling the mails with proposals for the removal of Lord Strathcona, and arrangements of Lord Strathcona in favor of the younger man, who is a member of the Dominion's premier colony.

From the High Commissioner's office a statement to-day obtained the following: "We will pay no attention to the anti-Strathcona agitation pending more definite developments. Since the establishment of this office Canada's trade with Great Britain has been troubled. We work early and late in the day to secure the best possible results for our country, and the allegations that we neglect business for society are utterly baseless."
