BANK OF ENGLAND. London, Oct. 8 .- The weekly statement of the Bank of England, issued today, shows the following changes as compared with the previous account: Total reserve, decrease, \$1,009,-000; circulation, increase, \$136,000 bulion, decrease, \$872,999; other securities, decrease. \$1.897.000. Other deposits, increase, \$537,000; public deposits, decrease, \$940,000; notes reserve, decreased, \$1,007,000; Government securities, increase, \$1,994,000. The proportion of the Bank of England's reserve to liability which last year was 52.14 per cent, is now 50.67 per cent.

Rosebery Resigns — His Reasons — Harcourt the Coming Man-Prass Comment.

Lord Rosebery's letter is dated at his seat, Dalmeny Park, Linlithgowshire, Oct. 6. In the communication his lordship says: "The recent course of events makes it necessary to clear the I find myself in apparent difference with a considerable mass of the Liberal party on the eastern question, and in some conflict with the opinion of Mr. Gladstone, who must necessarily always exercise matchless authority with the party, while scarcely from any quarter do I receive explicit support. This situation, except as regards Mr. stone, is not altogether new, but in saying this I complain of no one, and regret only that I should appear to divide the energies and try the faith of the Liberals. The question, how-

ever, is above and beyond personal considerations, and when I speak, which I do this week. I must speak Day mind without reference to party. Under those circumstances it is best for the party and for myself that I speak not as a leader, but as a free man. Consequently, I beg to notify you that the leadership of the party, so far as I am concerned is vacant, and that I resume my liberty of ac-I can feel only the deepest gratitude and regret at parting from you and those like you who have given me such loyal co-operation under circumstances so difficult." PRESS COMMENT.

The Daily News, Liberal, com-

menting on the Earl of Rosebery's withdrawal, says: Lord Rosebery has allowed himself to be maneuvered out of the leadership. Before he can be asked to resume the position he must be accorded a vote of confidence by his colleagues and party. The step taken by his lordship is a very grave and lamentable one. It is Mr. Gladstone's return to the field that has been the immediate and perhaps the inevitable cause. Mr. Gladstone's enunciated in favor of Great Britain's single-handed action in the east, regardless of consequences, conflict with the principles to which Lord Rosebery has adhered. In the present crisis Mr. Gladstone certainly has not got the whole nation nor the whole party behind him in that policy. The News argues that though Mr. Gladstone explained that he spoke as a private citizen, he cannot divest himself of the glamor of his old position, and the matchless authority which he exercised in the party, and that, therefore, when he intervened in practical politics in a sense out of harmony with the de-clarations of the recognized leader of the party, he made the latter's position very difficult. The pa-per concludes by saying that apart from the consideration of his age and health, the fit and proper course is for Mr. Gladstone to return to the leadership of his party. If he ready for this, assuredly everybody will acquiesce. Otherwise, Lord Rosebery holds the field and must be re-

exaggerated and misconceived the opposition to him. The Daily Chronicle, which has always opposed Lord Rosebery's leadership, contends that the general tone of the Liberal policy, as regards the east, is not represented by Lord Rosebery.
