SPAIN'S CABINET

Senor Silveira Succeeds Senor Sagasta as Premier.

Madrid, March 6.-The new cabinet took the oath of office Saturday. The ministry is composed as follows: Senor Silveira, premier and minister of foreign affairs.

Senor Dato, minister of the interior; Marquis Villa Verda, minister of finance.

Senor Duran, minister of justice. General Polavieja, minister of war. Marquis of Pidal, minister of public works for the colonies.

Admiral Camara, minister of marine. It is expected that Gen. Martinez de Campos will become president of the senate.

The brother of Marquis Pidal, it is thought, will be chosen as president of the Chamber of Deputies.

EXCITEMENT IN MADRID.

There was some excitement in the cafes when the formation of the Silveira cabinet was announced. The "Marsellaise" was sung, and there were cheers for liberty. Those who are in the immediate surrounding of Senor Silveira say his political ideas is to regenerate the country. He holds that the queen regent can ratify the treaty of peace without a vote of the chambers, and that, therefore, their dissolution need not defer the ratification.

MUTES MARRIED.

Buffalo, N. Y., March 6.-At the city hall on Saturday, Mayor Diehl married a deaf and dumb couple. Henry A. Acheson, at one time champion runner of the United States, was the groom, and his bride was Miss Carolyn K. Haller, of Batavia. The usual questions were written on paper, and a copy was given to the bride and groom. They read the questions and wrote "Yes" to them, each signing the paper. The couple then leaned over the mayor's shoulder as he read the solemn words pronounced them man and wife, and each nodded approval when the novel ceremony was finished. Acheson was born in Cayuga, Ont., 33 years ago, and is a printer by trade.

Carlisle Activity

Showing Signs of Revival All Through Spain.

Two Thousand Troops Have Deserted From Spanish Army.

Italian Warship Lands Marines at San-Mun Bay.

Chinese Foreign Office Refused to Grant the Requested Lease-Nearly 1,000 Deaths in Bombay From the Plague Last Week.

Madrid, March 6.-The Carlisle are showing signs of reviving activity. A band of 2,000 deserters from the Spanish army is now gathered near the French frontier, refusing to return to Spain, although the men have been pardoned.

Carlisle demonstrations, it is reported, have taken place at Valencia, but no details are procurable here.

FIFTY-TWO REBELS KILLED. London, March 6.-The Shanghai correspondent of the Daily Mail says that the leader of the rebels in the province of An Houi (Ngan Hoo), the notorious desperado Nui, has been captured, 62 of his bodyguard being killed.

ITALIAN REQUEST REFUSED BY CHINA. Pekin, March 6.-The Tsung-Li-Yamen (Chinese foreign office) has returned to the Italian charge d'affaires, Marquis Salvago Ragati, his dispatch regarding the demand of the Italian Government for a lease of San Mun Bay on the same conditions as those under which Germany holds Kiaoo Chau Bay, accompanying it with a letter declaring that the Chinese Government is unable to grant the request.

The demand of the Italian Government for 99-year lease of San Mun Bay, province of Che Kiang, as a coaling station and naval base, included also a demand for the concession of three islands off the coast of Che Kiang, with the right to construct a railroad from San Mun Bay to Po Yang Lake, and to preferential railroad and mining privileges within a sphere of influence covering the southern two-thirds of Che Kiang province.

CHINESE EXCITED. According to a dispatch to the Associated Press from Pekin last Friday, the action of the Italian Government had caused great excitement there, not only among the Chinese, but also among the foreign diplomats, the Chinese being convinced Great Britain was chiefly responsible for the demand, and that it had been made to emphasize Great Britain's displeasure at the turn which the Northern Railroad question had taken.

ITALIAN MARINES LANDED. London, March 6.-The Rome correspondent of the Daily Mail says: The Italian warships have landed marines at San Mun Bay, thus virtually taking possession. Italy will pay nearly \$20,000 (\$400,000) for the concession. The Tsung-Li-Yamen wishes to reduce the lease to 50 years.

ENGLAND BEHIND ITALY. The Pekin correspondent of the Times says: "It is asserted that since the Tsung-Li-Yamen returned Italy's dispatch, Sir Claude Macdonald, British minister to China, has presented a note supporting Italy's demand, and it is probable that Italy will now take possession of San-Mun Bay, encountering practically no resistance."

A Rome telegram says: Little attention is paid here to the refusal of the Chinese government to grant the requested lease of San-Mun Bay. The Italian government has decided that the concession will be made after further negotiations.

According to the Pekin correspondent of the Times the Tsung-Li-Yamen supports Great Britain against the protest of the Russian government regarding the terms of the Niu-Chwang Railway extension loan, recently subscribed in London.

RUSSIAN FORCE IN CHINA. It is learned from apparently good authority that Russia has 10,000 men at Port Arthur and 40,000 more in that general neighborhood.

THE POPE'S CONDITION. Rome, March 6.-Another satisfactory bulletin regarding the health of the pope was issued this morning. No other bulletin will be issued until Tuesday evening.

THE QUEEN OF BELGIUM. Brussels, March 6.-Queen Marie Henriette of Belgium, who is suffering from broncho-pneumonia, passed a better night. She slept a little, and the doctors are satisfied with her condition.

Brussels, March 6.-Late in the day it was announced that the queen's strength had much diminished, and that a fatal termination of her illness was still feared. A physician is in permanent attendance upon her majesty.

RAVAGES OF THE PLAGUE. London, March 6.-The Bombay correspondent of the Morning Post says: "The bubonic plague is raging here with unparalleled severity. According to the official register there were 872 deaths last week, but these quite understate the mortality."

KIPLING'S "ECHOES." London, March 6.-Sotherby, Kilgillson & Hodge, literary auctioneers, have sold a copy of Kipling's "Echoes," in the original wrapper published in Lahore, 1884, for 430 shillings, and a first edition of his "Departmental Ditties," in the original wrapper, for 170 shillings.

ROUND THE GLOBE IN 33 DAYS. St. Petersburg, March 6.-Prince Hilkoff, Russian minister of railways and telegraphs, who spent much time in America last year studying the railway systems there, announces that with the early completion of the Trans-Siberian Railroad the trip around the world can be made in 33 days.

CABLE NOTES. The English army and navy are in a better state of equipment, organization and fighting spirit today than at any time since Cromwell.

The brig Great Empress, which was sent from Liverpool to try and recover the mails from the wrecked steamer Labrador has returned to Tobermory, after being unable to salvage the ship. It is said that the Labrador has broken in two.

The sultan has just made another effort to raise the question of his sovereignty in Crete, which is too shadowy for his feeling.

London diplomats are informed that Japan may send Marquis Ito to England and the United States on a special mission. The Japanese government strongly desires an agreement with the United States and England in regard to questions in the Far East.

Burton, the last of the dynamite conspirators, has just been released from jail. He was sentenced in 1885 for complicity in the explosion in the underground railroad at Praed street, in 1883 whereby numbers of passengers were injured, and in the explosion at the Tower of London in 1885, through which several visitors were injured.

The registrar of the bankruptcy division of the high court of justice in London has ordered the prosecution of Ernest Terah Hooley, the company promoter.

The Daily Mail's report that the Japanese ambassador may ask Mr. Chamberlain to secure the disallowance of the British Columbia aliens bill excites no attention in London.

The coroner's jury in the case of the Very Rev. Andrew Kennedy Hays, a preacher and author who died at Bournemouth on Wednesday evening, brought in a verdict that his death was accidental, he having drunk carbolic acid in mistake for a sleeping draught.

THE POET'S GRIEF

Death of Rudyard Kipling's Daughter Josephine.

Who Passed Away This Morning From the Effects of Pneumonia.

New York, March 6.-Rudyard Kipling passed a comfortable night Saturday, sleeping most of the time, and seeming to benefit by it.

Elsie Kipling, the poet's three-year-old daughter, also improved during the night. Josephine, 5 years old, who is at the home of Mrs. DeForest, underwent no change during the night.

Another dispatch says Mr. Kipling is now recuperating on a diet of beef tea. He is gaining strength rapidly, considering how close to death he has been in the week just past.

Mrs. Kipling is much wearied by her constant care of her husband and children. Many messages were received today expressing the pleasure of the senders in learning that Mr. Kipling was on the road to recovery.

DEATH OF JOSEPHINE KIPLING.

New York, March 6.-Josephine Kipling, the 6-year-old daughter of Rudyard Kipling, and the oldest of his three children, died shortly after 6 o'clock this morning from pneumonia.

The child's death took place at the home of Miss Julie de Forest, in this city.

Miss de Forest is a friend of the Kiplings, and Josephine had been taken to her home so she could be nursed apart from her father. The girl became ill Sunday afternoon. Mr. Kipling took to his bed. The doctors soon discovered that the disease was the same as that which had brought her father to death's door. She had all the attention and skill employed to save the life of the author. Dr. Contand, the Kipling family physician, who had known the child from her birth, came down from Brattleboro, Vermont, and with Dr. Janeway succeeded in warding off the evil effects of the disease until today. But the little frame was not strong enough to withstand the onslaughts of the disease, and while her father was slowly winning back his life, Josephine died.

Mrs. Kipling had paid daily visits to the girl, and it was for her in this multiplicity of her sorrows that the sympathy of many friends was most earnestly expressed.

THE FATHER MAY NOT KNOW HIS LOSS.

It was generally believed that Mr. Kipling's condition was such that the physicians would not tell him until he should be stronger of the loss he had sustained.

Elsie, the 3-year-old daughter of the author, who is sick in an out of the way apartment in the hotel, was lying nicely, according to the morning's report of Mr. Doubleday.

MR. KIPLING'S CONDITION. Rudyard Kipling continues to improve, having slept naturally the greater part of last night. He has taken no solid food, and it may be a week before he is able to do so. He is subsisting on beef extract, milk and other fluid nutriment.

Elsie, Mr. Kipling's 3-year-old daughter passed a good night.
